Chairman Lynn called the meeting to order at 6:43 p.m. in the Churchill County Commission Chambers, 155 N. Taylor St., Fallon, Nevada. The CWSD/Alpine County Joint Powers Board was convened. Roll call was taken and a quorum was determined to be present. The Pledge of Allegiance was lead by Director Jardine.

<u>Item #5 - Approval of Agenda.</u> Director Bonkowski requested that Item #13 be pulled from the Consent Agenda for hearing. *Director Schank made the motion to approve the agenda as modified. The motion was seconded by Director Jardine and unanimously approved by the Board.*

<u>Item #7 - Approval of the Board Meeting Minutes from May 20, 2015</u>. - Director Penzel made the motion to approve the Minutes of the Board Meeting on May 20, 2015. The motion was seconded by Director Stodieck and unanimously approved by the Board.

Director Schank made the motion to approve the consent agenda items #8-20, absent #13. The motion was seconded by Director Penzel and unanimously approved by the Board. There was no public comment.

Item #13 - Discussion and possible action regarding approval of an Addendum to Interlocal Contract #2014-8 with **Dayton Valley Conservation District** for Middle Carson River Clearing, Snagging, and Maintenance Projects. Director Bonkowski requested correction to the draft contract shown on page 58 of the Board package. He noted that the Contract number is #2014-8 but is written as #2014-5 in the second Whereas paragraph.

Director Bonkowski made the motion to approve the Addendum to Interlocal Contract #2014-8 with Dayton Valley Conservation District as corrected. Director Abowd seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by the Board.

<u>Item #21 - Discussion for possible action regarding an update on the June 9-10, 2015, "Get on the Bus" Watershed Tour.</u> Ed James reported that there were over 50 people participating in the tour last week, with 31 speakers and nine stops. The group was varied and included three planners, a couple teachers, and one county supervisor. On the first day stops included Hope Valley at the Fishing Pier, the STPUD waste water outlet which is a popular stop, the Dangberg Home Ranch which included a tour of the home and the group had lunch, River Fork Ranch which included several speakers and a tour of the river restoration project, and then Baily Pond and Fuji Park where stormwater drain issues were discussed. The second day the tour went to Ambrose Park in Carson City, Ft. Churchill State Park in Lyon County to observe the river restoration projects, Stillwater Wildlife Refuge where the group had lunch, and Lahontan Dam including the gatehouse, which was the most popular stop on the tour.

Evaluation results were handed out to the Board. The tour was well received overall. Most people heard about the tour via email. The Lahontan Dam/Reservoir was most popular stop, with Stillwater second. Lowest ranking was River Fork Ranch so we will modify the questionnaire to determine why for future tours.

No action was required on this item; receive and file.

<u>Item #22 - Discussion for possible action regarding the legality of collecting precipitation in Low</u> <u>Impact Development (LID) projects.</u> Mr. James explained that Low Impact Development (LID) projects were talked about at the last meeting. Then on May 31, there was an article in the newspaper mentioning that it is illegal to collect runoff in rain barrels. Staff followed the article with a discussion about it with the State Engineer. He said that under state water law it was illegal to catch and retain rainfall, but collection in small barrels falls under de minimus use. A small rain barrel is okay, but a large collection tank is not legal. With a small collector you are only capturing the natural flow that is already occurring on the property and would seep back into the system. LID does not promote large capture ponds. Staff will be going to the various counties in the future to promote LIDs. Director Lynn commented that his last two development projects used LID practices but this article caught his attention. Director Erquiaga mentioned that it had to do when water is captured before it hits the ground. Mr. Benesch explained that the law says that any water above or below the surface of the ground belongs to the people of the State of Nevada. You don't really ever own water. It is the use of fractory right. He equated it to driving at 26 mph when the speed limit is 25 mph. It's not really a problem until you are driving much faster than the speed limit. The State Engineer isn't going to do a huge enforcement action unless someone complains about a severe misuse. This is more of an academic issue.

No action was required on this item; receive and file.

<u>Item #23 - Discussion for possible action regarding a review of the watershed survey questions.</u> Mr. James explained that the consultant hired to conduct the watershed survey, Responsive Management, has just completed the beta testing. After three rounds with the consultant and Education Working group the survey was modified from 50 questions to 37 question which only takes about 15-20 minutes. The consultant will contact people in the watershed to get 800 responses. Once the data is collected, we hope to compile it within the next couple of weeks. An intern who is working with staff will take the data to more detail than consultant will. Director Lynn asked who would be called. Mr. James responded that anyone who has a home phone can be called. A question will confirm that they are actually within our watershed to get a statistically relevant sample. We will find out what people do and don't know about the Carson River Watershed which will help with the education programs we do.

Director Schank asked about Question #6, should include drainages as a response. Mr. James explained that this is the full script; the interviewers will ask the questions, and the responses are for them to check off while giving survey.

Director Abowd expressed her concern that they are only contacting a portion of the population with home phones to be surveyed. They are missing a demographic which only has cell phones, most likely young people. Mr. James noted that when the survey is repeated this will have to be addressed since land lines are being phased out. Ms. Neddenriep texted Courtney Walker about the issue of what kind of phones would be included, and Ms. Walker responded that the consultants use electronic white pages which include both cell phones and land lines.

Director Schank suggested that the survey could be given at shopping malls, grocery stores, etc. Mr. James explained that was his original idea but the consultants did not recommend this method. Director Penzel noted that since cell phone numbers can travel with you when you move, you can't use area codes to choose participants. He suggested using Survey Monkey to send the survey on the internet. Mr. James explained that Survey Monkey may not be as random since you can only send Survey Monkey to known participants.

Director Bonkowski asked if it would make more sense to combine Questions #1 and #37, asking whether the participant is over and asking participant's age. Mr. James explained that the first several questions qualify the participant to take the survey, i.e., over 18. Then, after the participant has taken the survey, asking them to identify their age is more comfortable.

No action was required on this item; receive and file.

Item #24 - Discussion for possible action regarding a summary of legislative bills being followed by CWSD staff. Mr. James explained that a summary of bills being followed by CWSD is on pages 136-137 of the Board package. Almost every water bill died except for the one that transfers water in the Newlands Project. Most of the bills we were following didn't make it and died or changed at the eleventh hour.

- AB 169 regarding gray water passed both houses and was sent to the Conference Committee where the bill died.
- AB 198 requiring the Legislative Committee on Public Lands to conduct a study of water conservation and alternative sources of water for Nevada communities passed both houses and was signed by the Governor.
- AB 353 would require that professional services be awarded based on competitive bids. This bill died.
- AB 430, introduced by Robin Titus to provide funding for clearing and snagging, died for lack of funding. The good news is that we brought awareness to this issue, so hopefully it will get funding in the next legislative session.
- AB 455 would create a committee to do an interim study on current and future water supplies. This bill died.
- SB 70 making changes to the Open Meeting Law has passed both houses and was signed by the Governor.
- SB 423 was a request for funding for cloud seeding. This bill died.
- SB 476 for conservation districts assessment for noxious weeds was passed both houses and was signed by the Governor.
- SB 485 requiring a claimant of a pre-statutory (1905 for surface water and 1935 for ground water) water right to submit proof of the claim to the State Engineer on or before December 31, 2025, passed the Senate but was not heard by the Assembly.

Public Lands will be discussing water issues in the future. Ed will be attending drought workshops coming up.

No action was required on this item; receive and file.

Item #25 - Staff Reports

General Manager - Mr. James reported: 1) He met with the State Engineer on 6/15/15 about concerns with water issues in Douglas County about moving wells closer to the river. Mr. James explained that with the counties, anytime there is a request to move water rights all the entities throughout the watershed get together to talk about concerns before filing an application rather that the applicant filing and others protesting. We have had four or five such meetings which were very successful; when applications were filed issues had been worked out before. CWSD has no control over what private individuals do but would have concerns about moving wells closer to the river. The State Engineer has his hands full with the Humboldt and Walker Rivers, so he would like to avert problems on the Carson River. 2) Mr. James recognized CWSD staff for their help with the bus tour. He noted that the planning and execution of this annual endeavor is labor intensive.

Legal –Mr. Benesch reported on an issue that doesn't directly impact the Carson River basin. He explained that the senior federal judge denied two sub-cases in the Walker River litigation.

Correspondence – As included in the Board package and handed out.

Item #26 - Directors' Reports

Director Lynn stressed the importance of each Board member completing the General Manager's evaluation.

Director Schank reported that on 6/13/2016, TCID celebrated the 100th anniversary of the completion of Lahontan Dam on 6/30/1916.

Directors Erquiaga, Stodieck, Penzel, Bonkowski, Jardine, Fierro, and Abowd had nothing specific to report but joined in thanking the staff for arranging the tour of the Churchill Vineyards/Frey Ranch Estate Distillery and dinner at Stockman's Coffee Shop preceding the meeting.

Item #19 - Public Comment. None

There being no further business to come before the Board, Director Abowd made the motion to adjourn, seconded by Director Schank and unanimously approved by the Board. The meeting was adjourned at 7:27p.m.

DISCUSSION: Attached is a draft lease agreement between CWSD and Carson City for Mud Lake water. This lease agreement allows the Mud Lake water that is released in the Carson River during the non-irrigation season to be utilized by Carson City through their induction wells. The maximum amount of water that Carson City can pump in any given year is 526.25 acre-feet, less any losses imposed by the Nevada State Engineer. Currently, the State Engineer imposes a seven percent (7%) transportation loss.

This lease agreement follows the same format as the last lease agreement in 2010. The lease agreement is for five years. The starting lease price for the water is \$103.00/acre-foot. The cost of the water will increase each year based on the change in the Consumer Price Index (CPI).

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Approve and authorize the Chairman to sign the five-year Lease Agreement with Carson City for use of Mud Lake water. Agreement

WATER LEASE AGREEMENT

This Water Lease Agreement is entered into between the CARSON WATER

SUBCONSERVANCY DISTRICT, a political subdivision of the State of Nevada, by and through its duly constituted Board of Directors (hereinafter "CWSD") and CARSON CITY, a political subdivision of the State of Nevada, by and through its duly constituted Board of Supervisors (hereinafter "CITY").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, CWSD holds title to 526.25 acre feet of water rights, including storage rights in Mud Lake Reservoir;

WHEREAS, CITY desires to lease CWSD water for the next five (5) years for use within the boundaries of CITY for municipal purposes; and

WHEREAS, CWSD has made or will make any necessary application(s) to the State Engineer for permission to use CWSD water rights for the purposes contemplated under this Agreement.

THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual undertakings and for other good and valuable consideration, the parties agree and contract as follows:

1. <u>Terms of Agreement/Cost of Water</u>

The term of this Agreement shall commence on the date both parties have executed the Agreement and shall continue through September 30, 2020. CITY agrees to lease and use up to but not to exceed 526.25 acre feet of CWSD water, less any loss imposed by the State Engineer, subject to the requirements of Nevada water law, during the five year term. CITY shall use the

water during this term in accordance with the terms of the Final Decree in the case entitled *United States v. Alpine Land & Reservoir Company*, Civil No. D-183 BRT, United States District Court, District of Nevada (hereinafter "Alpine Decree").

If CITY does not intend to utilize all the Mud Lake water in any given year, CITY shall notify CWSD before the beginning of the next irrigation season, whereupon CWSD may lease the remaining unused water to another entity.

For the water delivery season beginning October 1, 2015, the CITY shall pay CWSD \$103.00 per acre foot for the use of said water as metered at CITY's point of re-diversion. For each water delivery season thereafter, CITY agrees to increase the price per foot of water paid to CWSD each year. The rate of increase shall be determined by and equal to the percentage change in the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI) - All Items (1982-1984 = 100), as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Washington, D.C., commencing with the index for the twelve month period ending September 30, 2015, as the baseline and using the annual percentage change change above the baseline each year thereafter. Such an increase will be applicable every year.

As used in this Agreement, the term (water delivery season" means the period beginning October 1 and ending March 31 of the following year. The calculation of the water used by City shall not include any loss of water determined by the State Engineer or the Federal Water Master, due to conveyance from Mud Lake Reservoir or any other CWSD storage facilities to CITY's point of re-diversion. Unless otherwise agreed to by both parties, CITY shall make to CWSD yearly payments in arrears by the 15th of June based on the metered usage during the previous water delivery season.

2. <u>Costs of Diversion and Delivery of Water</u>

CWSD shall bear the costs of delivery of the water to CITY's point of re-diversion,

including the costs of any required approvals by the State Engineer, operation and maintenance of upstream storage facilities, and payment of water fees to the Federal Water Master. CITY shall bear the costs associated with pumping the water from the Carson River, measuring devices, pipelines and other transporting devices. CWSD and CITY shall coordinate the delivery of water.

3. <u>Different Source of Water</u>

CITY agrees that CWSD in its sole discretion may deliver a like amount of water from a source or sources other than Mud Lake Reservoir so long as the timing of the water delivery is mutually acceptable.

4. <u>Treatment</u>

CITY shall be responsible for the treatment of all water for municipal purposes, including water leased from CWSD, to applicable local, state and federal standards.

5. <u>Hold Harmless</u>

CITY agrees to indemnify and hold CWSD harmless for any claims or actions including damages, costs and attorneys fees concerning the use of this water by CITY as specified in this Agreement.

6. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>

This Agreement shall bind all successors in interest and assigns of CWSD and CITY.

7. <u>General Provisions</u>

The officials executing this Agreement hereby warrant and guarantee that they have the authority to act for and bind the respective organizations which they represent; all notices required by this Agreement shall be in writing, must be sent to the addresses provided herein and are

deemed effective upon placement in the United States Mail, postage prepaid; this Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties; this Agreement shall be enforced and construed according to the laws of the State of Nevada; the prevailing party to any dispute involving this Agreement is entitled to an award of reasonable attorneys fees and costs; any modification of this Agreement must be made by a writing signed by both parties; portions of this Agreement which are held invalid are severable from the rest of the Agreement; this Agreement may be recorded in the office of the Carson City Recorder and the Douglas County Recorder; the preamble and recitals are hereby made a part of this Agreement; and this Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which is deemed an original but together which constitutes but one and the same agreement.

8. <u>Continuing Appropriation</u>

Pursuant to NRS 244.320, the Board of Supervisors of CITY has no authority to bind CITY to a contract beyond the terms of the Supervisors in office at the time of the contract approval. If a future Board of Supervisors of CITY does not appropriate money for this Agreement, CITY is no longer bound by this Agreement.

DISCUSSION: Carson City would like the option of leasing Lost Lakes water this year. The cost of the Lost Lakes water is the same as the Mud Lake water. Attached is a draft Water Lease Agreement for the Board's approval.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Approve the Water Lease Agreement with Carson City for the use of Lost Lakes water.

WATER LEASE AGREEMENT

This Water Lease Agreement is entered into between the CARSON WATER SUBCONSERVANCY DISTRICT, a political subdivision of the State of Nevada, by and through its duly constituted Board of Directors (hereinafter "CWSD") and CARSON CITY, a political subdivision of the State of Nevada, by and through its duly constituted Board of Supervisors (hereinafter "CITY").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, CWSD holds title to 219.0 acre feet of water rights, including storage rights in Upper and Lower Lost Lakes Reservoirs, Claim Numbers 812 and 813 in the Alpine Decree; and

WHEREAS, CITY desires to lease CWSD water for one (1) year for use within the boundaries of CITY for municipal purposes; and

WHEREAS, CWSD has made or will make any necessary application(s) to the State Engineer for permission to use CWSD's water rights for the purposes contemplated under this Agreement.

THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual undertakings and for other good and valuable consideration, the parties agree and contract as follows:

1. Term of Agreement/Cost of Water

The term of this Agreement shall commence on the date both parties have executed the Agreement and shall continue through June 30, 2016. CITY agrees to lease and use an amount not to exceed 50.0 acre feet of CWSD water from Lost Lakes.

CITY shall pay CWSD \$103.00 per acre foot for water pumped by CITY. As used in this Agreement, the term "water delivery season" means the period beginning October 1, 2015, and ending March 31, 2016. The amount of water that can be pumped by CITY shall be determined by the actual amount of water released from Lost Lakes less any loss of water determined by the State Engineer or the Federal Water Master, due to conveyance from Lost Lakes Reservoirs to CITY's point of re-diversion. CITY shall pay CWSD for only the amount of water that is pumped, and CITY shall make payment to CWSD by no later than the 15th of June based on the actual metered usage.

2. <u>Costs of Diversion and Delivery of Water</u>

CWSD shall bear the costs of delivery of the water to CITY's point of re-diversion, including the costs of any required approvals by the State Engineer, operation and maintenance of upstream storage facilities, and payment of water fees to the Federal Water Master. CITY shall bear the costs associated with pumping the water from the two induction wells (Well Numbers 25 and 41B), measuring devices, pipelines, and other transporting devices.

3. <u>Treatment</u>

CITY shall be responsible for the treatment of all water for municipal purposes, including water leased from CWSD, to applicable local, state, and federal standards.

4. <u>Hold Harmless</u>

CITY and CWSD agree to indemnify and hold the other harmless for any claims or actions including damages, costs, and attorney's fees concerning the use of this water by CITY as specified in this Agreement.

5. <u>General Provisions</u>

The officials executing this Agreement hereby warrant and guarantee that they have the authority to act for and bind the respective organizations which they represent; all notices required by this Agreement shall be in writing, must be sent to the addresses provided herein, and are deemed effective upon placement in the United States Mail, postage prepaid; this Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties; this Agreement shall be enforced and construed according to the laws of the State of Nevada; the prevailing party to any dispute involving this Agreement is entitled to an award of reasonable attorney's fees and costs; and any modification of this Agreement must be made by a writing signed by both parties.



The plan provides an overview of the watershed and looks at the integrated watershed management related to seven project categories. The plan is critical as it was approved by the Federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Region 9 and addresses the nine criteria elements of the Clean Water Act Section 319 relating to non-point source

pollution/polluted runoff. This document allows others within the watershed to apply for EPA 319 funding through Nevada's Department of Environmental Protection.

Carson Water Subconservancy District comments regarding the Bureau of Land Management, Carson City District Draft Programmatic Environmental Assessment/Integrated Weed Management Plan June 30, 2015

The Carson Water Subconservancy District (CWSD) is a multi-county, bi-state agency dedicated to establishing a balance between the needs of the communities within the Carson River Watershed and the function of the river system. CWSD's mission is to work within existing governmental frameworks to promote cooperative action for the watershed that crosses both agency and political boundaries. CWSD acts as lead agency for integrated watershed planning and facilitates the Carson River Coalition stakeholder group.

CWSD believes it is important for the treatment of invasive species on BLM land within the Carson City District (CCD) to occur regularly. CWSD funds treatment of noxious weeds in each county in the Carson River Watershed (Alpine, Douglas, Carson, Lyon, Storey and Churchill counties), all of which are in the CCD. There is a multitude of collaboration and money being spent to treat noxious weeds throughout the watershed and it is critical that treatment is occurring on BLM land within the CCD to further enhance and ensure local efforts are effective.

CWSD supports the following activities as proposed in the document:

Using the most current treatment methods available will:

- Update the list of approved herbicides, adjuvants, and surfactants that will:
 - reduce the risk to wetland and riparian plants
 - o reduce the resistance of noxious weeds to existing herbicides
 - have lower toxicity to wildlife, livestock, water quality, non-target plants
 - be more effective on noxious weeds and cause less harm
 - be used in remote areas where other methods aren't feasible
- Add the use of biological treatments and prescribed fire treatments as alternative methods of treatment. This increases the variety of treatments that can be utilized on BLM land, thereby increasing the success rate of treatments.
- Increase the overall acreage of noxious weeds that will be treated on BLM land.
- Improve native plant diversity, abundance and connectivity for the benefit of wildlife and their habitats.
- Decrease wildfire frequency and intensity by removing noxious weeds that are hazardous fuels.

CWSD has concerns with the following highlights of the proposed document:

It is critical to treat infested sites on BLM land in the CCD as soon as possible, especially near adjacent property owners who are working to comply with Nevada State Statutes. CWSD is aware that some noxious weeds within the CCD have been mapped, but rarely have been treated in the past few years. CWSD recommends that BLM treat noxious weeds in the CCD using mechanical, chemical, and manual methods as stated in the No Action Alternative while this document is being finalized.

CWSD recommends that BLM and local partners develop a strategy moving forward so priority areas are identified. CWSD recommends clarifying the timeframe for authorizing site specific treatments, and to clarify if all seven steps need to be completed every time. CWSD recommends that these steps be streamlined to be able to conduct treatments as soon as possible.

CWSD recommends that BLM work with the local stakeholders (counties, conservation districts, state and regional governments, and non-profits) within cooperative weed management areas to provide the most effective treatments across property boundaries. It is critical for BLM to share mapping data with all stakeholders, especially the Nevada Department of Agriculture, so they can be aware of potential noxious weed introduction.






Q21. Thinking about this general area, in your opinion, what is the most important environmental issue facing the area?




Q23. What water-related issue is the most important environmental issue facing the area? (Asked of those who stated a water-related issued was the most important environmental issue facing the area.)




Q27. When water is flowing or draining from your property, such as storm or rain water, where does it ultimately drain or go to?




Q30. Do you know which local water body [drainage from your property] drains into?






Q35. What is the source of your tap water?




Q41. How much would you say you know about watersheds? Would you say...?





Q43. Do you currently live in a watershed?




Q49. How important to you, personally, is the health of the Carson River Watershed's environment on a scale of 0 to 10, where 0 is not at all important and 10 is extremely important?







Q54. In your opinion, what are the most important issues that negatively affect the health of the Carson River and its watershed?






Q70. What do you think is the primary source of polluted run-off in the Carson River and the watershed's environment?




Q72. In your opinion, how much do yard and land maintenance practices affect the health of the Carson River and the watershed's environment?




Q73. In your opinion, what is the single most important action you can take to help protect or improve the health of the Carson River and the watershed's environment?




Q75. Are you currently taking this action? (Asked of those who named a specific action they can take to help protect the health of the Carson River and the watershed's environment.)









Q86-126. Percent who have taken the following actions within the past 5 years:











Q132. Where do you get your information on local watershed or water quality issues?






Q143. What is the highest level of education you have completed?

DISCUSSION: Attached is a summary of the Directors' reviews of the General Manager. All the Directors completed the review forms. Also, during the past month the General Manager has met with most of the Directors to discuss what they believe is important to the watershed and what assistance CWSD can provide. Below is a summary of the comments:

Churchill County -

- Concerns regarding the loss of agricultural users and land along the Carson River, i.e., the need for conservation easements.
- Concerns about U.S. Fish and Wildlife purchasing more water rights in the Newlands Project causing groundwater declines and dust issues.
- Concerns about the costs to repair the Truckee Canal. The cost to do the Environmental Impact Study (EIS) for the Truckee Canal study is estimated to cost \$6 million.
- Need to expand the Churchill County's water system and the possibility of interties with the City of Fallon and Navy water systems. In some areas of the county domestic wells are starting to dry up.

Storey County -

- Need to develop Landscaping Ordinances.
- Need to develop a drainage system and uncouple the sewer and drainage systems.
- Leasing water for future demands conjunctive use.
- Need to develop a Floodplain Master Plan.
- Promote communication between Storey County and Churchill County.
- Develop a water supply for the Highland area. Possible exchange for Marlette Water.
- Concerns about water level declines and water quality concerns in the Mark Twain area.

Carson City -

- Concerns about the costs to upgrade the wastewater plant. Evaluate ways the utility could use the reclaimed water that seeps into the Carson River.
- Promote LID along Highway 50 and the downtown area.
- Promote communication with all counties in the watershed.

Douglas County –

- Protect the water resources in the county.
- Find ways to keep agriculture in the valley.

- Promote water conservation.
- Better relationship between the county and the residents.
- Funding for flood problems in the Pinenut area.
- Need a Stormwater Plan.
- Better Public outreach.

- Begin to deal with the issue of wet water vs. paper water.
- Increase public awareness of flooding along the Carson River and alluvium fan flooding.

Carson's water situation looks good — for now

o far, so good. That's the gist of Carson **City's** water situation, according to city officials tracking supplies and usage, and it's based on interviews as July took over from June with a heat wave gripping the region.

Heat has been mitigated occasionally by intermittent cloudiness with scattered thunderstorms, and those conditions followed a brief earlier period of spring showers. With drought in its fourth year, however, nobody is declaring much more than hedged optimism as Independence Day looms and summer hits its stride.

"We'll be OK in this community," said Mayor Robert Crowell, "but we shouldn't be cautious and conservative regarding our resources — including water."

His assessment was echoed in many ways by Darren Schulz, **Public Works Depart**ment director, and David Bruketta, city utility manager, as they discussed those late spring rains, the early summer heat and their impacts on supplies for residential or commercial uses. as well as the treated wastewater effluent and supplemental water used to keep prison farms irrigated and golf courses green. Schulz discussed the former, Bruketta the latter.

"I felt really good with the wet that we had," said Schulz, referring

with triple-digit temperatures at hand for Carson City and the region, he's growing a bit nervous. He trotted out his oft-repeated view of water supplies going forward, calling himself cautiously optimistic.

"I continue that feeling for this year," he said.

The public works director said it is too early to tell if residents are heeding his call in spring for voluntary 10 percent water cutbacks on such things as showers, the time they water lawns, washing vehicles and the like. He said it's too early partly because of the rain a few weeks back and partly because he needs more statistics to warrant an analysis.

He said, however, that departmental vigilance continues to monitor whether people follow water restriction guidelines. Local government asks for oddeven residence watering with none on Mondays and alternating usage on other days.

The program calls for homes with odd street address numbers to water Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, those with even numbers the other three days each week.

Cooler parts of the day or night are best, so watering is barred from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. on days it is allowed. Some people water at night, as Schulz noted, and he has shifts of temporary workers called "water watch staff" to monitor residents' usage and make sure they aren't fudging on prohibited days or hours, as well as checking and following up on waste water hotline tips.

"A lot of people do use the water hotline," he said, citing an average of about perhaps five calls weekly from people concerned about overuse or incorrect usage by others. He said that hotline, which is (775) 283-7397, brings some knowledge of potential offenders and yet doesn't account for all his staff's monitoring efforts. "In a week," he said, "we probably talk to and/or cite 10 or 15."

He said for the most part, people comply when contacted to curb excess or improper water usage.

"I know for a fact that we haven't fined anybody," he said, "so we haven't had a three-peat offender yet."

So far, so good **on** with all that, and Bruketta's **arena** doesn't **look** a great deal different at **this** stage.

"It's going well," said Bruketta, delving into the situation regarding effluent distribution and usage at state prison farms or golf courses. He also talked of the dry early months of this year, the short rainy respite and the current heat wave as he emphasized the next three months should tell the tale.

"In May," he said, "we had significantly cooler temperature and some moisture." May data showed the city in relatively good shape regarding reclaimed water usage, partly due to the coolness and the precipitation that helped keep things in hand. Trough the end of June, as far as he can determine short of full statistical analysis, he's hopeful. He tracks matters monthly, but June data won't become fully clear for a week or so.

"Looking at their cumulative use through June," he said of those who take the effluent off the city's hands, "they're very close to last year."

He said the problem was those first three months when it was so dry, which kept him nervous as Carson City entered spring.

"That's when we raised the red flag," Bruketta said, his way of warning the users to keep a handle on irrigation as much as possible. The prison farms, public and private golf course complexes handle the effluent for city government because federal dictates require that treated wastewater not go in the Carson River. In recent years, however, the effluent needed for allocated watering has come up short and a city supplement came into play.

As of early June, Bruketta reported, cumulative reclaimed water usage this year was trailing the same time in 2014. On June 3, he wrote the users that cumulative usage through May showed a decrease of 8 percent when compared with last year at the same time. Last year, he said, 886 acre-feet had been used; this year through May, it was 815 acre-feet. An acre-foot of water amounts to approximately 325,850 gallons.
