The videos try to underscore it saves money to keep floodplains open rather than to re-engineer developed floodplains. John Cobourn mentioned that they are very professional and a great promotion for FAW. Steve Lewis asked that the videos be sent to our local news stations. Brenda Hunt explained that NEON is being hired to create a watershed campaign and these videos will be included in the campaign.
 - B. Flood Damage Field Trip (John Cobourn) Several sites were selected as possible sites.

Appendix C – CRC Floodplain & River Management Working Group Comments

Site Selection and Timing – The field trip to learn about flooding from observing flood damage. The following locations were suggested:

- i. In Douglas County on the East Fork, two summers ago work was done for clearing and snagging and the project did some good but straightened the channel which could cause some problems down the road. This would be a possible tour stop. How can we maintain the channel to keep it available for ag but also protect it from headcuts, etc.?
- ii. Steve Lewis suggested touring the V-canal in Churchill County and discussing what's to become of that. What is the weed control considered for that area?
- iii. Shane suggested just upstream of the Hwy. 88 bridge where there's a big berm.
- iv. Brenda suggested the Hussman property headcut which was created from flooding and high flows.
- v. Damage at Minor Ranch in Dayton.
- vi. Shane suggested Buzzy's Ranch in CC area.
- vii. Wolf Creek head-high debris covering the road.
- viii. Hope Valley restoration projects.

This is too much area to cover in a one-day trip; we may want to have a subcommittee to work on setting them up.

Brenda suggested having moveable Floodplain & River Management WG meetings with tours in various areas. Perhaps the field trips could be in line with a theme like weeds; LID projects for drainage culverts, ditches, right-of-ways; developments; commercial parks; strip malls with ditches which are not being maintained and causing water to back up; NDOT right-of-way and drainage off Hwy. 50 and Clear Cr areas which may be compromised. Work with counties and Chambers of Commerce in the future to encourage LID development. Zack Wood for Alpine County, Michael Johnson for Churchill County, conservation districts. Instead of going to all the different counties, you can see most of what you need to in Carson City and Douglas County arranged in an elevational approach with field trip sites from top to bottom. John suggested that this approach would be even better for a tour for the general public.

Clean Water Plan 319(h) grant proposals are due to NDEP in September. Brenda and Shane are putting in for a two-year Watershed Coordination grant. Perhaps we can apply for a LID project in urban centers in three reaches in the next five years. We need to come up with way to locate sites for the Management Plan. LIDs can help keep flooding minimized by providing infiltration.
