MINUTES OF LAST BOARD MEETING

CARSON WATER SUBCONSERVANCY DISTRICT BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND CARSON RIVER WATERSHED COMMITTEE MEETING February 20, 2019, 6:30 P.M. DRAFT Minutes

Chairman Erquiaga called the meeting of the Carson Water Subconservancy District (CWSD) to order at 6.37 p.m. in the Conference Room of NAI Alliance, 1000 N. Division St. #202, Carson City, NV. Roll call of the CWSD Board was taken and a quorum was determined to be present.

<u>Item #4 – Discussion Only: Public Comment</u> – Mr. James informed the Board of the serious injuries sustained by Brenda Hunt (WS Program Manager) during a recent skiing accident and she would be out for several weeks during recovery.

<u>Item #5 – For Possible Action: Approval of Agenda.</u> Chairman Erquiaga made the motion to approve the agenda. The motion was seconded by Director Jacobs and unanimously approved by the CWSD Board.

<u>Item #6 – For Possible Action: Approval of the Board Meeting Minutes of December 19, 2018.</u> Mr. James noted that the location needed to be corrected to the Bonanza Room at the Community Center. Director Schank made the motion to approve the Board Meeting Minutes of January 16, 2019 with the correction of the location. The motion was seconded by Director Jacobs and unanimously approved by the Board.

<u>Item #9 – Roll Call</u> – Chairman Erquiaga convened the Carson River Watershed Committee and a roll call was taken.

<u>Item #10 – Discussion Only: Public Comment</u> – None

<u>Item #11 – Discussion Only: Public Comment</u> – Discussion by Tom Minor regarding flood preparedness.

Tom Minor introduced himself as a ranch owner in Dayton. He thanks the Board for all their hard work and says he is very proud of the work done in Dayton Valley. If anyone would like a tour of his ranch, please contact Ed to arrange.

Dan Kaffer introduced himself and said he wanted to talk about a Flood Relief Package and FEMA in the 1980's. The Division of Wildlife declared this river dead. He had worked with FEMA in Super Fund Area on multimillion-dollar projects. After the 2017 flood the community thought that FEMA would help cover the damage costs. FEMA did not cover anything. He's

citing major projects where the damage that could not be seen until the after had receded and FEMA was already gone. He feels there should be a protocol put into place for emergency situations so that projects do not get sidelined. He thinks it would be good to put forth to new county commissioners and they should be taught how to handle these situations. Emergency training needs to be done and we need to have a complete overhaul of protocols.

Director Giomi asks regarding disaster damage assessment – does the state approach us to address this or not?

Mr. James states in 1997 and 2005-6, CWSD took the lead for repairs with FEMA along the river. This time there was an issue with who could file with FEMA. We don't own the property and the state of Nevada did not file.

Director Giomi says we must be on the frontend of damage assessments so deadlines are not missed.

Mr. Kaffer says each county is different. There needs be some oversight that is consistent regarding USDA/State emergency relief dollars. All Federal and State money should be used. There has to be a lead entity to lead in an emergency to coordinate the activities in the event of disaster.

Mr. Griffith states opportunities are lost due to not being prepared.

Director Schank adds that protocols must be put into place.

Director Giomi asks – Do we have inventory of all improvements and projects on the river?

Mr. James answers no: The conservations districts and state lands has most but not all this information.

Director Jacobs asks about assets. Is there a list of owner or maintenance on completed projects?

Mr. Minor answers no, not really – and project damage rolls over and affects the next project. He says conservation districts have inventories.

Mr. Kaffer says that losing diversion is a problem; this holds the whole system together. Everything fits together and should be coordinated.

Director Bonkowski asks if we can add this issue to the Strategic Planning agenda.

Mr. James says yes, we need to pull together all entities to set protocols for emergency situations.

Director Schank says we need a master inventory from conservation districts, plus improvements and projects.

Director Schank says we should be the keeper of the inventory and provide the information to the state of Nevada.

Mr. Kaffer says we need a list of what's available out there in the event of emergency and what resources are available at the time of need. History and documentation are good to have. He thinks it's a good to involve state to have their help with FEMA, etc.

Mr. Minor says it would be good to have a checklist of protocol to make sure things get done in each county.

Director Jacobs asks if there are issues related to floods that need attention.

Mr. Minor says yes; restoration and innovating projects are ongoing. Protocols and records are needed for this too.

Director Workman asks if conservation districts are funded by us.

Mr. James responds that we do provide funding, but we do not have a hazard mitigation fund/plan for Carson River.

Director Giomi says Truckee has a plan for this. Hazard mitigation plan is a good idea! Mr. Kaffer volunteers to help with this project.

This was for discussion only and no action was taken.

<u>Item #12 – Approval of the 2019 Water and Sewer Rate Report.</u> Ms. Neddenriep introduced her report. Douglas and Lyon counties and Carson City are conducting rate studies. Ms. Neddenriep mentioned that she would welcome Director Jacobs and Director Workman help in revamping the report format.

Director Jacobs made the motion to approve the 2019 Water and Sewer Report. The motion was seconded by Director Giomi and unanimously approved by the Board.

Item #13 – Approval of an increase to the living stipend for CWSD's AmeriCorps member/Watershed Technician, Justin Bedocs. Mr. Fryer discussed Justin's time at CWSD: This is his second term with AmeriCorps and he has increased his position and has become a valuable member of the team. The traditional housing provided by AmeriCorps to its employees will no longer be available in the near future, so CWSD is requesting that the Board approve a Housing Stipend of \$300 per month to be added to the compensation for this position. This would not only help our current AmeriCorps during his tenure with us, but it would also make an working with CWSD more desirable for our future AmeriCorps employees. The matching grant program provides us an amazing opportunity for this position which is comparatively valued at \$30 per hour.

This was for discussion only and no action was taken.

Item #14 -: Approval of an Agreement with Resource Concepts, Inc. to develop "Geomorphology 101" presentations to county staff and public officials in an amount not to exceed \$10,000. Shane explained that this is a proposal to educate public officials and applicable staff in this important area so they are better able to make decisions concerning the Carson River. The proposal includes Lynn Zonge, RCI as presenter using a PowerPoint at 10 locations covering all counties in the Watershed.

Mr. James mentioned this project was proposed by the CRC and is funded by NDEP. Director Workman asks if RCI can also look into what we were discussing earlier regarding inventory of projects.

Director Jacobs says it would be good to take notes at these presentations as they will spark good conversation that should be documented.

Director Workman says all counties should be in on the conversations and made aware of what is happening all along the river. Everything affects each other.

Mr. Fryer says this can be the first of many presentations to follow.

Director Giomi says the cost is really reasonable.

Director Penzel would like to see storm water to be included in the conversation and be added to the scope of the project.

Director Thaler made the motion to approve with the stipulation that it be capped at \$10,000. The motion was seconded by Director Gray and unanimously approved by the Board.

Item #15 - Provide direction to CWSD Staff regarding the 2019 Nevada Legislative Session.

- Mr. James discussed the Legislative Committee meeting that was held January 28, 2019 and reported the consensus on the following pending legislation:
 - AB30, AB51 & AB 62: Recommended CWSD monitor these bills.
 - AB70: Involves changes to Open Meeting Law to include attendance via teleconferencing. CWSD recommends opposing based on costly compliance.

- AB 84 CWSD changes have been submitted and recommends support with these changes.
- AB 95 Mr. James calls this the "Pahrump" bill, but it could affect our watershed so we need to watch this one. CWSD recommends support of this bill.
- AB47 This bill was introduced by State Lands to deal with diversions in the Truckee and Carson Rivers. CWSD recommends monitoring this bill.
- SB 96 Looking for the state to set up funding source for matching funds (Federal funds) for projects around the state. CWSD recommends we provide direction as appropriate on this one.

Mr. James will keep the Legislative Committee updated on his meetings and new things as they come up during the session.

No action was taken on this item.

<u>Item #16 – Discuss and provide input on the draft Amicus Brief for the Walker Lake</u>

<u>litigation</u> – Mr. King presented and spoke about the latest version of the brief. He says that Nevada is unique in that all water is allocated by decree.

Director Workman wonders if communities should be changes to municipalities?

Director Jacobs is concerned about water rights, appropriations and the cascading effects of this.

Director Giomi cautions against using the word municipality because it has unique and specific meaning Nevada.

Mr. King says there is a formula that is used.

Director Schank suggests we add why is this so important to CWSD. It took 56 years to complete the Alpine Decree for the Carso River.

Mr. James questioned new timing for submittals.

Mr. King says he has asked Supreme Court for date to file. Douglas County may want to join in our brief.

Mr. James suggests we bring an updated version to the March meeting for another reading. Please submit any ideas for edits to him.

No action was taken on this item.

Item #17- Discussion about a possible meeting date for the CWSD Strategic Planning

<u>Session</u> – Mr. James asks everyone to take out their calendars to select a date for the strategic planning session. This will be important for team building. Christie James will be facilitating. It would have been best to hold it prior to the Finance Committee meeting, but earlier dates did not work out and we are now looking at March. Going through several dates around that table, Monday, March 18, 9am-2pm at the NAI conference room was confirmed by all in attendance.

Director Schank suggests everyone submit five things most important to them to address, then we can poll the Board to narrow the focus.

<u>Item #18– Public Comment</u> - Justin Bedocs thanks everyone for considering his housing stipend request.

<u>Item #26 – Alpine County Reports</u>: Mr. Griffith reported that the EPA is going to discuss the Leviathan Superfund Project on Tuesday, March 5, 6pm at Turtle Rock Park. The Alpine Watershed Group has been authorized funding for another year to test the treated waste water with the STPUD operation. They are testing for pharmaceuticals constituents. He says this is the most snow on Highway 88 he has ever seen. He apologized for Director Jardine's absence.

SUBJECT: Agenda Item #9– <u>For Possible Action</u>: Approve CONTRACT #2018 – 11A: Funding from Carson Water Subconservancy District to the Dayton Valley Conservation District for Post-flood Repairs Project MCR 002, 030, 046, 111C, and 010C; in an amount not to exceed \$75,000.

DISCUSSION: This project was already approved in the 2018-19 budget but the contract was not initiated.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Authorize Chairman Erquiaga to sign contract.

INTERLOCAL CONTRACT

Funding from Carson Water Subconservancy District to the Dayton Valley Conservation District for Post-flood Repairs Project MCR 002, 030, 046, 111C, and 010C

THIS CONTRACT dated this 20th day of March 2019, is entered into by and between DAYTON VALLEY CONSERVATION DISTRICT, a political subdivision of the State of Nevada (hereinafter "DISTRICT") and the CARSON WATER SUBCONSERVANCY DISTRICT, a political subdivision of the State of Nevada (hereinafter "CWSD").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, DISTRICT is a governmental subdivision of the State of Nevada a public body corporate and politic, organized in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 548 of the Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS); and

WHEREAS, CWSD is a water subconservancy district created and organized under the provisions of Chapter 541 of NRS; and

WHEREAS, this Contract is entered into under the provisions of NRS 277.180 and must be ratified by appropriate official action of the governing body of each party as a condition precedent to its entry into force; and

WHEREAS, CWSD and DISTRICT each possess common objectives and responsibilities with regard to the Carson River; and

WHEREAS, DISTRICT has requested \$75,000.00 funding during fiscal year 2018-19 for their Post-flood Repairs Project MCR 002, 030, 046, 111C, and 010C, as identified and described in Exhibit "A."

WHEREAS, CWSD has agreed to set aside \$75,000.00 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2018, and to grant DISTRICT said amount in order to assist with the 2017 Flood Damage Repairs Project.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants herein contained, it is mutually agreed by and between the parties as follows:

1. CONTRACT TERM:

a CWSD hereby grants to DISTRICT \$75,000.00 to assist with their 2017 Flood Damage Repairs Project, which is further identified and described in Exhibit "A"; and

- b DISTRICT will submit requests for funding periodically. The request for funding shall be accompanied by a description of what the funds will be used for and shall reference this Contract.
- c CWSD commits to pay the approved amount of the request to DISTRICT within four (4) weeks of said request.
- d DISTRICT will submit Project Summary Reports (see Exhibit "B"), including before and after project pictures, project goals, etc., prior to final invoice payment or ten percent of grant funding will be withheld until reports are submitted.
- e CWSD shall have no responsibility for costs exceeding \$75,000.00.
- This Contract shall terminate June 30, 2019, at which time DISTRICT shall have one (1) month thereafter to submit its final invoice for payment related to work performed under this Contract.
- Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, any obligation of CWSD hereunder is conditioned upon CWSD's funding resources. If for whatever reason the CWSD's funding resources are reduced or eliminated, CWSD reserves the right to terminate this Agreement immediately in writing. CWSD will reimburse DISTRICT for all costs that occurred under this Agreement up to the date the Agreement is terminated.

2. LIMITED LIABILITY AND INDEMIFICATION:

- a. The parties will not waive but rather intend to assert available NRS chapter 41 liability limitations in all cases. Contract liability of both parties shall not be subject to punitive damages. To the extent applicable, actual contract damages for any breach shall be limited by NRS 353.260 and NRS 354.626.
- b. Consistent with paragraph 2.a of this Contract, each party shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend (not excluding the others right to participate) the other party from and against all liability, claims, actions, damages, losses, and expenses, including, but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees and costs, arising out of any alleged negligent or willful acts or omissions of the indemnifying party, its officers, employees and agents. Such obligation shall not be construed to negate, abridge, or otherwise reduce any other right or obligation of indemnity which would otherwise exist as to any party or person described in this paragraph.
- c. The indemnification obligation under this paragraph is conditioned upon the receipt of written notice of claim within thirty (30) days by the indemnified party. The hold harmless and indemnification provision shall

- not apply to attorneys' fees and costs for the indemnified party's chosen right to participate with legal counsel.
- d. If the DISTRICT hires a contractor to perform any portion of this project, the contractor will add CWSD as an additional insured. The contractor must carry the Liability Insurance requirements are described in Exhibit "C."
- e. Prior to commencing the activities that constitute the Project, DISTRICT shall deliver to CWSD a certificate issued by its insurance carrier naming CWSD as an additional insured and stating that the policy will not be modified or cancelled without 30 days' notice to CWSD.

4. ENTIRE CONTRACT AND MODIFICATION:

- a. This Contract shall be by and between the parties hereto and shall not be assignable or transferable.
- Any dispute regarding this Contract shall be decided according to the laws
 of the State of Nevada. If any part of this Contract is declared to be
 unlawful, any remaining obligations shall be deemed terminated.
- c. This Contract may only be amended by consent of both parties. Any amendments must be written and executed with the same formality as this Contract.
- d. This Contract constitutes the entire understanding between the parties and there are no representations, conditions, warranties or collateral agreements (expressed or implied), statutory or otherwise, with respect to the subject of this Contract.

5. PROPER AUTHORITY:

a. This Contract becomes effective when ratified by appropriate official action of the governing body of each party; however, the DISTRICT can submit expenses that have been incurred from July 1, 2018, forward.

- b. The parties hereto represent and warrant that the person executing this Contract on behalf of each party has full power and authority to enter into this Contract and that the parties are authorized by law to engage in cooperative action set forth herein.
- c. This Contract shall be entered into with duplicate originals, realizing that each entity, by necessity, must approve and execute the subject document at different dates, times and places.

Dayton Valley Conservation District

PROJECT NAME: Post-flood repairs MCR 002. 0301 046, 11 IQ and 010C

PROJECT LOCATION/ADDRESS: Middle Carson River, Dayton Valley - Empey (Casey) Ranch, Barnes, Morse, Lehman, and DEG properties, respectively.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

Three bank stabilization projects sustained significant damage during the 2017 floods and subsequent spring runoff. Additional damage was incurred during the brief period of high flow in mid-late November 2017. This project provides for critical repair of these bank stabilization projects. Rip-rap will be replaced on MCR 002 (Empey/Casey) and 030 (Barnes), including the streambed stabilization trenches, with bioengineering incorporated on the banks. MCR 046 is a bioengineering project that will receive rip-rap reinforcement in the affected area, with incorporation of bioengineering features. Some channeling work will be done in the project areas to re-establish the low water channel at the proper location, reducing pressure on damaged areas.

PROJECT GOALS AND BENEFITS:

The primary goal of the work is to curtail further erosion of affected areas, restoring the damaged projects' effectiveness in reducing bank erosion and head-cutting of the river bed, thereby improving water quality and clarity by reducing instream sediment. Additionally, the restoration of the low-flow channel will help prevent excessive future flooding to a nearby home, and to adjacent private properties/irrigation ditches and infrastructure.

Liability Insurance

- a. <u>General Liability Insurance</u>: Prior to commencement and for the duration of activities that constitute the Project that is the subject of this Contract, Contractor shall maintain commercial general liability (CGL) as follows:
 - i. Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) General Aggregate.
 - ii. Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) Products & Completed Operations Aggregate.
 - iii. One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) Each Occurrence.
 - iv. CGL insurance shall be written on ISO occurrence form CG 00 01 04 13 (or a substitute form providing equivalent coverage) and shall cover liability arising from premises, operations, products-completed operations, personal and advertising injury, and liability assumed under an insured contract [(including the tort liability of another assumed in a business contract)].
 - v. CWSD, its officers, employees and immune contractors shall be included as an insured under the CGL, using ISO additional insured endorsement CG 20 10 or CG 20 26, or a substitute providing equivalent coverage, including coverage under the commercial umbrella, if any.
 - vi. This insurance shall apply as primary insurance with respect to any other insurance or self-insurance programs afforded to CWSD There shall be no endorsement or modification of the CGL to make it excess over other available insurance; alternatively, if the CGL states that it is excess or pro rata, the policy shall be endorsed to be primary with respect to the additional insured.
 - vii. There shall be no endorsement or modification of the CGL limiting the scope of coverage for liability assumed under a contract.
 - viii. Contractor waives all rights against CWSD and its agents, officers, directors and employees for recovery of damages to the extent these damages are covered by the commercial general liability or commercial umbrella liability insurance maintained pursuant to this Contract. Insurer shall endorse CGL policy as required to waive subrogation against CWSD with respect to any loss paid under the policy.

ix. Prior to commencing the activities that constitute the Project, DISTRICT shall deliver to CWSD a certificate issued by its insurance carrier naming CWSD as an additional insured and stating that the policy will not be modified or cancelled without 30 days' notice to CWSD.

f. <u>Business Automobile Liability Insurance</u>:

- Contractor shall maintain automobile liability and, if necessary, commercial umbrella liability insurance with a limit of not less than \$1,000,000 each accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- ii. Such insurance shall cover liability arising out of owned, hired, and non-owned autos (as applicable). Coverage as required above shall be written on ISO form CA 00 01, CA 00 05, CA 00 25, or a substitute form providing equivalent liability coverage.
- iii. Contractor waives all rights against CWSD and its agents, officers, directors and employees for recovery of damages to the extent these damages are covered by the automobile liability or other liability insurance obtained by Contractor pursuant this Contract.
- iv. Prior to commencing the activities that constitute the Project, DISTRICT shall deliver to CWSD a certificate issued by its insurance carrier naming CWSD as an additional insured and stating that the policy will not be modified or cancelled without 30 days' notice to CWSD.

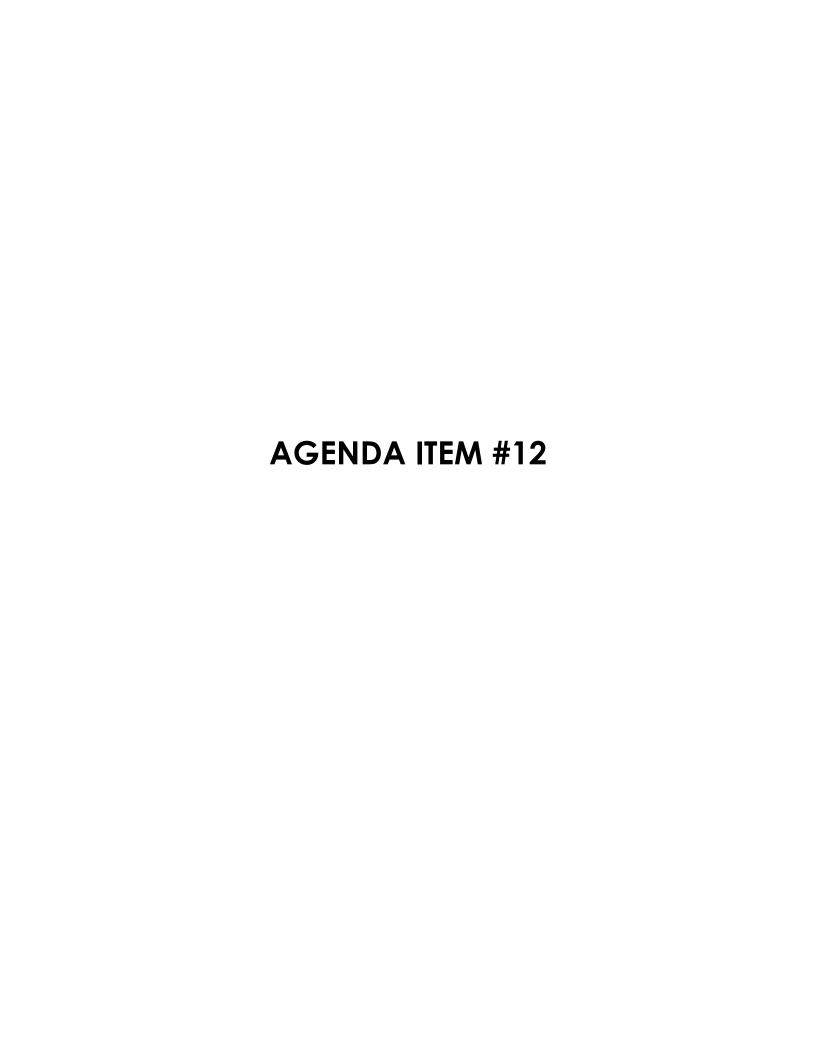
g. <u>Professional Liability Insurance</u>

- i. Contractor shall maintain professional liability insurance applying to all activities performed under this Contract with limits not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) and Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) in the aggregate.
- ii. Effective date: Prior to commencement of the performance of this Contract.
- iii. Contractor will maintain professional liability insurance during the term of this Contract and for a period of three (3) years after termination of this Contract unless waived by the CWSD. In the event of non-renewal or other lapse in coverage during the term of this Contract or the three (3) year period described above, Contractor shall purchase Extended Reporting Period coverage for

- claims arising out of Contractor's negligence acts, errors and omissions committed during the term of the Professional Liability Policy. The Extended Reporting Period shall continue through a minimum of three (3) years after termination date of this Contract.
- iv. Prior to commencing the activities that constitute the Project, DISTRICT shall deliver to CWSD a certificate issued by its insurance carrier naming CWSD as an additional insured and stating that the policy will not be modified or cancelled without 30 days' notice to CWSD.

SUBJECT: Agenda Item #12 – <u>For Possible Recommendation</u>: Discussion for possible action regarding approval of the Tentative FY 2019-20 Budget for the General, Acquisition/Construction, and Floodplain Management Funds.

DISCUSSION: On February 28, 2019, the CWSD Finance Committee reviewed the proposed Tentative Budgets for FY 2019-20. The committee spent more than half the day reviewing the proposed budget and listening to funding requests from various entities in the watershed (see attached draft meeting minutes). The committee had to cut \$195,000 to balance the budget. Based on the discussion at the meeting, attached are the proposed tentative budgets as recommended by the Finance Committee for FY 2019-20 for the General Fund, Acquisition/Construction Fund, and Floodplain Management Fund. Click here to link to the projects presented.

Each of the tentative budgets is divided into three columns. The left column shows the proposed budget for FY 2019-20, the center column shows the adopted budget for FY 2018-19, and the right column shows the projected actual income and expenses for FY 2018-19. For the General Fund Tentative Budget, the numbers in blue are grant funds and the numbers in red are projects the Finance Committee reduced.

In Fiscal Year 2018-19, CWSD earmarked \$70,000 in the Acquisition/Construction Fund to evaluate water storage in the watershed. This project got combined with the USBR Water Market study. The money for this expense is shown as Other Income in the General Fund.

Attached is a pie chart that shows the percentage of expenses in the General Fund by categories of Administration, Projects, Studies, Programs, Projects Funded by Grants, Programs Funded by Grants, and Studies Funded by Grants.

The projected income from Ad Valorem taxes is staff's best guess. The actual projected tax figures from the State will not be available until March 25. Since this report from the State comes out after the board meeting, staff is recommending that the State projection for Ad Valorem taxes be inserted before the Tentative Budgets are sent to the State.

FINANCE COMMITTEE and STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Approval of the FY 2019-20 Tentative Budgets for the Acquisition/Construction Fund and the Floodplain Management Fund as presented, and approval of the General Fund with the Department of Taxation Ad Valorem tax figures inserted when they become available.

The meeting was called to order at 8:30 a.m. by Committee Member Bonkowski, CWSD Treasurer. The meeting was held in the Conference Room of the Carson Water Subconservancy District, 777 E. William St., #110, Carson City, Nevada. A quorum of the Finance Committee was present.

Item #3 - Public comment: None

Item #4 - Discussion for possible action regarding approval of the minutes from the Finance

Committee meeting on March 5, 2018: Committee Member Penzel made the motion to approve the minutes of the Finance Committee meeting on March 5, 2018. The motion was seconded by Treasurer Bonkowski and approved unanimously.

Item #5 - Discussion regarding the Tentative General Fund FY 2019-20 budget and hear presentations for proposed projects; review the Tentative Acquisition/Construction Fund FY 2019-20 budget; and review the Tentative Floodplain Management Fund FY 2019-20 budget:

Mr. James explained the General Fund Budget spreadsheet and the committee process as he noted that Director Workman is new this year. The committee will reach consensus on budget recommendations to be brought to full Board for action at the March 20, 2019 meeting.

Starting in the income section he explained that the proposed county taxes are based on a conservative 3% increase over last year, but the official numbers from the state will not be available until March 25. The increase may be as high as 5.5%, but we will base our proposed tentative budget at 3%. He further explained grant income and interest income on the spreadsheet. On the expense side, he noted an increase in salary based the assumption of a 2% cost of living and merit increase, benefit cost increases due to health insurance changes with staff, and increase in PERS contribution. There was a discussion regarding reimbursing all Directors for mileage. (This would require a policy change and is planned for the to be discussed at a future Administrative Committee meeting.)

Mr. James reviewed all the grant expenses that are offset by the grant income. He also noted that it is required by law that there be a minimum 4% of expenses in our ending balance.

Presentations of Proposed Projects

Carson River Projects:

Carson Valley Conservation District - Bioengineering, Maintenance and Debris Removal

Mike Hayes, CVCD Coordinator

Project to stabilize vertical cutbanks throughout Carson Valley as well as stabilize soil, improve water quality, reestablish vegetation and removal of woody debris. Asking \$60,000. Pictures showing extent of erosion of rivers banks over a ten-year period (2007-17) were distributed and it was also reported that this is a priority for landowners who are willing to put money into this project as well.

Carson Valley Conservation District - Genoa Bank Stabilization

Rich Wilkinson, CVCD Coordinator

Project to restore vertical cutbanks along a ¾ mile long and 12 to 15 feet high. Asking for \$100,000. Goal to also stabilize soil, improve water quality and reestablish vegetation for wildlife. CVCD considers this a high priority project since this are was severely impacted by the recent flooding events in 2017.

Carson Valley Conservation District - Time Extension Cradlebaugh Stabilization

Rich Wilkinson, CVCD Coordinator

Mr. James explained this is a carryover from last fiscal year (2018-19) because of some permit issue. Director Penzel questioned carry-over funds and how we account for them in budget. Mr. James explains how the carryovers are tracked but agrees there needs to be a better process.

River Wranglers- Carson River Work Days

Darcy Phillips, Executive Director

Conserve Carson River Work Days and Vegetation Management. This is educational outreach program serving students in six watershed counties. Asking \$26,000. Would like to expand program to get to more schools and also work with at-risk kids, too. Is partnering with parks and recreation to start middle school pilot program. Program had participation of over 1400 students this year. Mr. James explains money is used to match another grant.

Alpine County Watershed Group- Upper Carson River Watershed Programs

Kimra McAfee, Executive Director

This is a community outreach program to restore and monitor the Alpine County watershed. Asking \$25,000. Treasurer Bonkowski asked about funding and Ms. McAfee explained the timeline of funding approvals. Alpine County is fully grant dependent. Director Workman asked how community outreach is done with only 30 students in Alpine County. Ms. McAfee described Adopt-a-Highway, Willow Planting, Family Projects, etc. as well as Sorenson and Bentley being supporters and donors.

<u>Dayton Valley Conservation District – Bank Stabilization/Channel Restoration Upstream from Dayton</u> Bridge

Rob Holley, District Manager

Project to remove cottonwood trees that pose a threat to irrigation diversions and to the Dayton Bridge. Asking \$100,000. In addition this project addresses the severe and ongoing bank erosion, loss of mature cottonwood trees (into the river), loss of private agricultural land, and the accumulation of cottonwood and willow growth within the river channel.

Dayton Valley Conservation District – Fort Churchill Project – Time Extension

Rob Holley, District Manager

Mr. Holley asked that the unused funds for FY2018-19 be carried over to FY 2019-20. The Fort Churchill Project had to be delayed because the contractor backed out.

Lahontan Conservation District – Carson River Channel Clearing

Christy Sullivan, LCD District Manager

Project to prevent and minimize property loss and other damage during flood condition. Also to maintain a clear channel to enable citizens to utilize the river for recreation and maintaining river flow velocity to prevent stagnant pools that pose health risks. Asking \$35,000.

Community Projects:

Churchill County - Dixie Valley Water Level Measurement & Precipitation Gage Monitoring

Chris Mahannah for Jim Barbee, County Manager

Project continues long-term gauging of precipitation and water levels that is important for water to the Lahontan Valley. Asking \$65,000. Director Penzel wondered aloud why BOR is not contributing and why Churchill is contributing so little. Director Schank believes this is a watershed issue with regional benefit to everyone and noted that BOR was the original funder for this project. Director Bonkowski asks about the water quality. Mr. Mahannah says it will need to be treated. Director Bonkowski thinks quality and quantity are important and wants to make sure that this is part of the project study.

Truckee-Carson Irrigation District - Carson Diversion Dam Repairs

Rusty Jardine, General Manager (No representative present.)

<u>Carson City - Carson City Reclaimed Master Plan (Update)</u>

Andrew Hummel, Wastewater Utility Manager, CCPW

Project to update Reuse Master Plan to understand the current and long-term issues related to reclaimed water reuse as Carson City continues to grow. Asking \$50,000 (50% Match)

Carson City - Mexican Dam Ditch Intake Structure Improvement (Mexican Ditch Bridge)

Gregg Berggen, Trails Coordinator

Project to make structural improvements to the Mexican Ditch intake that would construct a 7 ½ foot wide bridge to permit safe potage of small watercraft around the Mexican Dam as well as being equestrian, bicycle and pedestrian friendly. This would eliminate the current public safety issues and allow for the Carson River Aquatic Trail to extend into the Carson Valley. Asking for \$25,000. Bridge would provide safe passage for people to get around dam without going on private property. Project is shovel ready and the plan is to be done by December 2019. Presentation included four letters of support for this project: Douglas County Community Services, Carson Valley Trails Association, Muscle Powered, and Resource Concepts, Inc.

USGS:

USGS Monitoring Hg,Ar, Ld & Sediment in Carson River

Angie Paul, Hydrologist, USGS Nevada Water Science Center

This project is a continuation of 2017-18 Mercury Monitoring Program. Asking \$3,000 (Matching funds)

7500-00 USGS Stream Gage Contract

Steven Berris, Nevada Networks Chief

This project is a continuation of the cooperative monitoring program. Asking \$78,405 for FY 2019-20 and \$78,405 for FY 2020-21.

7508-00 USGS Douglas & Lyon Counties Co GW Collection Data

Steven Berris, Nevada Networks Chief

This project is a continuation of the cooperative monitoring program. Asking \$16,890 for FY 2019-20 and \$16,890 for FY 2020-21

New Projects:

<u>Sierra Nevada Journeys – Family Watershed Nights & Watershed Map Project</u>

This Watershed Education project is for Douglas County and Carson City. The events have great participation that are targeted to elementary school kids and their parents. \$13,000 from CVCD genoa Bank Stabilization Project \$10,000 from DVCD Bank Stabilization Project \$10,000 from LCD Channel Clearing Project \$3,000 from USGS Hg Monitoring \$50,000 from TCID Carson Diversion Dam Repairs \$50,000 from Transfer to Floodplain Management Account \$50,000 from Transfer to Acquisition/Construction Account \$10,500 from American River Meadow Restoration

Treasurer Bonkowski made the motion that the Finance Committee recommend that the tentative budgets for the General Fund, the Acquisition/Construction Fund, and Flood Management Fund be approved as adjusted above. Committee Member Schank seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by the Finance Committee. Mr. James was directed to send a clean copy to committee members before sending to the entire Board for review.



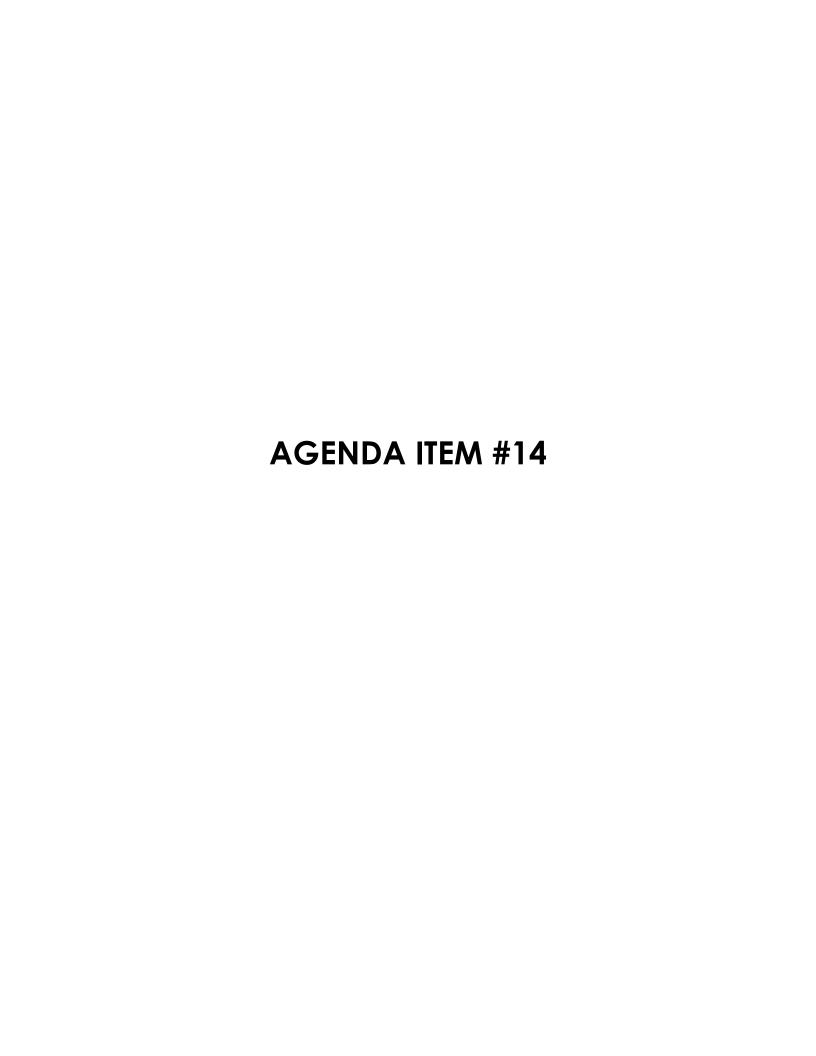

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I. INTRODUCTION AND IDENTITY AND INTEREST OF AMICUS CURIAE

Carson Water Subconservancy District (CWSD) has an interest in filing an amicus brief with the Nevada Supreme Court in the case of *Mineral County v*. *Walker River Irrigation District*, 900 F.3d 1027 (9th Cir. 2018), because of the impact that this case will have on all Decrees and Nevada water law involving surface and ground water rights in the entire state of Nevada. Based on this concern, the CWSD submit their amicus brief opposing the use of the public trust doctrine to take water away from currently decreed and appropriated water rights, and to respond to the two questions the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals has requested the Supreme Court of Nevada to answer. The United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit certified to this Court the following questions:

- 1) Does the public trust doctrine apply to rights already adjudicated and settled under the doctrine of prior appropriation and, if so, to what extent?
- 2) If the public trust doctrine applies and allows for reallocation of rights settled under the doctrine of prior appropriation, does the abrogation of such adjudicated or vested rights constitute a "taking" under the Nevada Constitution requiring payment of just compensation?¹

The Court stayed all further proceedings in the case and is holding both the public trust and takings claims "in abeyance pending the result of certification." ²

The CWSD, pursuant to Nevada Rules of Appellate Procedure (NRAP) Rule 29(a)(2), submits this amicus brief to assist the Court in answering these two important questions.

The Carson Water Subconservancy District, hereinafter CWSD, is a unique multi-county, bi-state agency dedicated to establishing a balance between the needs of the communities within the Carson River Watershed and the function of the river system.³

CWSD acts as lead agency for integrated watershed planning and funds the Carson River Watershed Coordination Program, which facilitates the Carson River Coalition. CWSD strives to involve all counties and communities within the watershed in the effort to meet the various future water needs, enhance the health of the river system, protect the floodplains, and provide outreach and information to the community. CWSD's mission is to work within the existing governmental frameworks to promote cooperative action for the Carson River that crosses both agency and political boundaries. CWSD serves as an information resource for the

development. The reliability of vested water rights is closely tied with economic development, because water is necessary for agricultural, municipal, mining, and domestic uses. For these reasons, Elko County has an interest in filing an amicus brief with the Nevada Supreme Court in the case of *Mineral County v. Walker River Irrigation District*, 900 F.3d 1027 (9th Cir. 2018).

I. STATEMENT OF THE CASE

Under common law "public trust" doctrine, the state owns and has a duty to manage tidal and navigable waters, together with the lands beneath them, in trust for the public. While the doctrine was originally understood to focus on navigation, commerce and fishing, various state courts "over time have developed the doctrine alongside the public's changing uses of water to incorporate additional public purposes, including traveling, bathing, recreating, hunting, protecting the ecosystem, preserving scenic beauty, and maintaining access to the waters." The issue in this case is this: can the public trust doctrine be used to trump state law and take away water rights already adjudicated and settled under the doctrine of prior appropriation?

While the case giving rise to the questions being submitted to the Nevada Supreme Court concerns the Walker River, the result of this Court's answers to the two questions issued by the 9th Circuit will affect the security of *all* water rights in the State of Nevada.

A. Background to the Walker River Case

In 1936, the United States District Court of the District of Nevada issued a final decree over all claims to the waters of the Walker River and its tributaries,

including claims on behalf of the Walker River Paiute Tribe. The Decree was amended by the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals in 1939. That decree had settled surface water rights to the Walker River. In 1991, the Walker River Irrigation District petitioned the decree court to enforce its decreed rights. The United States and the Paiute Tribe filed counterclaims, claiming new water rights for a reservoir built on the tribal land. In 1994, Mineral County moved to intervene, asking the Court to modify the decree to provide minimum levels to maintain the viability of Walker Lake.

In 2015, the decree court dismissed Mineral County's complaint for lack of standing, while concluding that the public trust doctrine could not be used to reallocate decreed rights without constituting a taking for which just compensation must be paid.¹⁴ Mineral County appealed to the Ninth Circuit.¹⁵

The Ninth Circuit held the U.S. District Court erred by dismissing Mineral County for lack of standing.¹⁶ The court then analyzed the public trust doctrine jurisprudence in Nevada, noting that the Nevada Supreme Court expressly recognized the doctrine but "whether it allows reallocation of rights settled under the separate doctrine of prior appropriation" remains unsettled.¹⁷

II. LEGAL BACKGROUND

Nevada's comprehensive water law embraces the public trust doctrine and does not violate it. The Public Trust Doctrine should not apply to rights already adjudicated and settled under the doctrine of prior appropriation and if raised should not create a private right of action. Nevada Law provides judicial review of water allocation decisions of the State Water Engineer affording adequate safeguards and legal remedies to protect the public trust.

The abrogation of adjudicated water rights settled under the doctrine of prior appropriation would constitute a "taking" under the Nevada Constitution requiring payment of just compensation. There is significant value in water rights and a marketplace for its sale and acquisition. This marketplace ensures that changes in priorities and values can be accommodated into the future for the benefit of the state and our people. If the right to use water can be taken in a court proceeding without the need to pay for it, the marketplace will fail and there is no workable substitution to accommodate future development, technology and public values.

IV. ARGUMENT

A. Water rights already adjudicated and settled under the doctrine of prior appropriation should not be subject to reallocation under the public trust doctrine

The prior appropriation doctrine, codified into Nevada's water laws with the establishment of the Office of the State Engineer in 1903 is the foundation for allocating water throughout the state of Nevada. Nevada's water statutes codified common law appropriations in Nevada. The statute declared these appropriated

water rights to be in the public interest.²⁰ With a limited water resource and with the major watersheds (Walker, Carson, Truckee, and Humboldt) all flowing into the Great Basin, all the water in Nevada is fully utilized. As such, Nevada's water systems and the availability of water is unique from other states. All major watersheds in Nevada have already been allocated by decrees. There is no "separate source" of water that could be tapped into to fill a mandated allotment or reallocation of water. A request for water would necessarily require another person or persons to surrender their allocated water. Ranching, farming, mining, and communities were all created with the fundamental understanding of water allocation through the prior appropriation doctrine.

i. The Public Trust Doctrine in Nevada

In defining a state's trust obligations under the public trust doctrine, the United States Supreme Court held that the public trust applies to bed and banks underlying navigable waterways, and that a state may not divest itself of control over the trust property, "except as to such parcels as are used in promoting the interests of the public therein." This Court expressly adopted the public trust doctrine and set forth Nevada's public trust doctrine framework in *Clark County v Lawrence*. Finding that application of the public trust doctrine in Nevada is founded upon the policies established in the state constitution and statutes, this Court ruled that it was the Nevada Legislature that had the responsibility to "act as a fiduciary of the public in its administration of trust property." In *Lawrence*, this

Court found that "another source of Nevada law that evinces the public trust doctrine is our statutory law, specifically, NRS 321.0005 and NRS 533.025."²⁴

Recognizing Nevada Law, this Court held that: "by its express language, NRS 321.0005 contemplates fiduciary-type duties with regard to the state's administration of state lands." NRS 533.025 provides that "[t]he water of all sources of water supply within the boundaries of the State whether above or beneath the surface of the ground, belongs to the public." Notably, NRS 533.025 does not provide that Nevada's water belongs to the state; rather, it "belongs to the public." Therefore, the public trust doctrine in Nevada requires that decisions regarding allocation of water are made in the public's interest.

ii. Voluntary and statutory programs already exist in Nevada to solve the problems highlighted by the Walker Lake litigation. These successful programs do not require the upheaval of Nevada's framework of water law.

The Walker Basin Restoration Program was established by Congress in October 2009 by Public Law 111-85, with the Program's primary purpose to restore and maintain Walker Lake. ²⁶ This is one existing program that is successfully addressing the problems of Walker Lake. In 2017, the non-profit Walker Basin Conservancy (WBC) accepted the lead for all implementation efforts to restore and maintain Walker Lake while protecting agricultural, environmental and recreational interests in the Walker River Basin. The program includes a voluntary water rights acquisition program with willing sellers to reduce upstream water use with permanent increases in freshwater inflows to the Lake. To date, The

Walker Basin Conservancy (Conservancy) has acquired 40 percent of the water rights required to restore Walker Lake.²⁷ The Conservancy acquires land, water and related interests from willing sellers in the Walker River Basin to restore and maintain Walker Lake while protecting agricultural and recreational interests. In 2017, WBC assumed the lead role for the Walker Basin Restoration Program, previously administered by the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation.²⁸ This voluntary water acquisition program is working; Walker River has reached Walker Lake for the first time in 6 years and is providing Walker Lake with much needed fresh water.²⁹ Also, Walker Lake has risen 12 vertical feet since the beginning of 2017.³⁰ The U.S. Geological Surveys, having run simulations for inflows to Walker Lake, predicts the lake will rise by as much as 15 to 18 feet this year, the most in a single year in recorded history.³¹

The CWSD was directly involved in the Newlands Project Water Rights Fund, another successful voluntary water buyout program. In 1999, the Nevada legislators passed AB 380, establishing the Newlands Project Water Rights Fund and a related program for the acquisition of certain surface water rights; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.³² This law included a voluntary

water buyout program to reduce litigation in the Newlands project.³³ Per the bill, the CWSD administrated this program.³⁴

iii. Nevada's established water law, in NRS 533.010 to NRS 533.560, requires the State Engineer to consider the public trust, incorporating all public trust values in deciding how to best appropriate water.

This Court held in *Lawrence*: "In sum, NRS 321.0005 and NRS 533.025 effectively statutorily codify the principles behind the public trust doctrine in Nevada." In Nevada any divestment of the public trust property must serve a beneficial use. There can be no legal entitlement to the use of water if beneficial use is not established. The Nevada Legislature requires the State Engineer to determine that the "public interest" is served when addressing the appropriation of water rights. This Court has held that the State Engineer properly defined and proscribed the meaning of "the public interest" within his authority under NRS 533.370(3). Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe of Indians v. Washoe County, the State Engineer identified guidelines derived from Nevada's water statutes (i.e., NRS Chapters 533, 534 and 540) to be considered when evaluating the "public interest." The CWSD's experience working within the Carson River Basin is that the State Engineer does protect the public trust and works to ensure that all water

allocations are in the public interest. As such, Nevada's comprehensive water law is in harmony with and consistent with the public trust doctrine.

iv. Cases being represented as authoritative on the issue of the public trust in Nevada involving states that don't adhere to the law of Prior Appropriation do not offer reasonable comparisons and should be disregarded.

It is important to recognize that the public trust doctrine has never been used to retroactively reallocate settled water rights in a state with laws based on prior appropriation. Prior appropriation states have not imposed requirements beyond their statutory laws covering water rights. And, the public trust doctrine has not been used to reallocate previously established and appropriated rights.

Colorado's water law, like Nevada, is based on prior appropriation.⁴¹ When addressing the application of the public trust doctrine within Colorado water law, Colorado rejected the analysis in *National Audubon Society v. Superior Court*, ⁴² as inapplicable to Colorado law. ⁴³ The Colorado Court held that California's reasonable use doctrine "has never been the law in Colorado's 'pure' prior appropriation system." Nevada should do the same. The water law in Idaho, like

Nevada is based on prior appropriation.⁴⁵ Idaho passed a statute that its law of prior appropriation satisfies the public trust doctrine.⁴⁶

When considering if the State Engineer should look to the laws of other states, this Court held, there is "no indication that Nevada's Legislature intended that the State Engineer determine public policy in Nevada by incorporating another state's statutes . . ." to analyze the public interest.⁴⁷ However, should this Court look to other states, only those states that also follow strict prior appropriation offer reasonable comparisons.

B. The abrogation of adjudicated or vested water rights is a "taking" under the Nevada Constitution requiring payment of just compensation.

Under Nevada Law, a water right is considered and protected as real property. 48 It cannot be taken without compensation. 49

Any argument that taking away the water is not a taking because the owner still owns the water right is absurd.

For a taking to occur, a claimant must have a "stick in the bundle of property rights." The bundle of property rights includes "all rights inherent in ownership, including the inalienable right to possess, use, and enjoy the property." Nevada Ranchers, farmers, miners and communities acquired water

rights so they could use the water for a beneficial use. They need to use the water to meet the needs of their cattle, farm, business or development. They didn't buy or acquire the water right so they could frame a certificate. Take away the use of the water itself and the water rights are meaningless.

Importantly, as discussed above, there is the market place for the sale and acquisition of water rights. If water can be taken away without paying for it, then the market place will fail and current successful programs to acquire water rights will also fail.

In the California case of *National Audubon Society v. Superior Court*, the court ruled that the state's "continuing supervisory control" over water resources subject to the trust "prevents any party from acquiring a vested right to appropriate water in a manner harmful to the interests protected by the public trust." Thus, limiting the claim of having a vested appropriative water right in California. In that case the Supreme Court clarified the scope of the 'public trust doctrine' and held that the state as trustee of the public trust retains supervisory control over the state's waters such that no party has a vested right to appropriate water in a manner harmful to the interests protected by the public trust.

The CWSD encourages this Court to adopt a better rule consistent with Nevada law that considers a water right to be a property right. This Court should apply a traditional regulatory takings analysis to takings claims arising from regulatory restrictions on the use of water. The *Penn Central* analysis ⁵⁴ has been

applied to takings claims arising from regulatory restrictions on a wide variety of property interests and there is no apparent reason why the same analysis should not apply to takings claims arising from restrictions on water use since a water right is considered and protected as real property in the State of Nevada⁵⁵.

i. There Will Be Harmful Consequences Should the Public Trust Doctrine Supersede Nevada's Existing Water Law.

If the Public Trust Doctrine was deemed to supersede Nevada's existing water law then all existing water rights would be subject to being taken. Increased piecemeal litigation would disadvantage farmers, ranchers, and property owners with limited resources to fight motivated developers and large corporations. There would be a lack of certainty that would hurt long term planning. The efforts of the CWSD, and other voluntary and statutory programs in the State of Nevada would be impaired.

V. CONCLUSION

Nevada is unique from other states due to its limited water resources and the fact that surface water in Nevada has been allocated by decrees. The water law in Nevada, based on prior appropriation is fair, requiring a determination of beneficial use and public interest. The legislature is best suited to establish laws consistent with evolving public needs and changing priorities. Nevada's water law is appropriately managed by the State Engineer, considering public trust values and ultimately, affirmed, or altered by the courts. Predictability and certainty are prerequisites to vital marketplace investments in our state. Our current frame work

appropriate diversity in our State's development. The public trust doctrine should not be interpreted to allow piecemeal litigation to retroactively reallocate decreed water rights. As a valuable and necessary property interest the absence of which can make land worthless, water rights cannot be taken without just compensation. To hold otherwise would subvert the marketplace in Nevada that is currently responding to the public trust values of Nevada.

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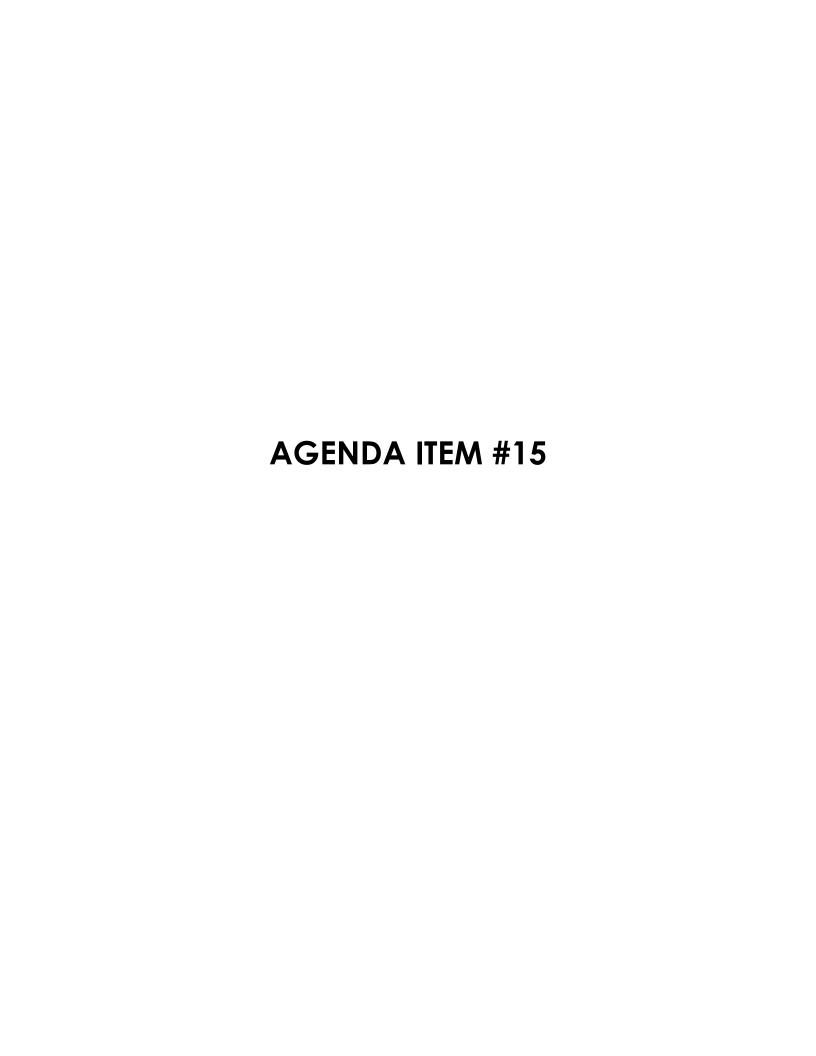




