## CARSON WATER SUBCONSERVANCY DISTRICT BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND CARSON RIVER WATERSHED COMMITTEE MEETING February 19, 2020, 6:30 pm

## **Minutes**

Chairman Erquiaga called the meeting of the Carson Water Subconservancy District (CWSD) to order at 6:30 pm in the Bonanza Room, Carson City Community Center at 851 E. William Street. Roll call of the CWSD Board was taken and a quorum was determined to be present.

Roll call of the Caron River Watershed Committee was taken which included CWSD Directors and Committee Members, Don Jardine and Austin Osborne.

## <u>Item #4 – Discussion Only: Public Comment</u> – None

## Item #5 - For Possible Action: Approval of Agenda

Director Schank made a motion to approve the agenda as presented. The motion was seconded by Director Jacobs and unanimously approved by the Board.

### Item #6 – For Possible Action: Approval of the Board Meeting Minutes of Jan. 15, 2020

Director Penzel made a motion to approve the Board Meeting Minutes of



January 15, 2020 as presented. The motion was seconded by Director Bonkowski and unanimously approved by the Board.

## <u>Item #7 - For Possible Action: Approval of Treasurer's Report for January 2020</u> Item #8 - For Possible Action: Approval of Payment of Bills for January 2020

Director Schank made a motion to approve Consent Agenda items as presented. The motion was seconded by Director Giomi and unanimously approved by the Board.

## <u>Item #9 - For Possible Action: Provide Guidelines to the Finance Committee regarding funding for the Acquisition/Construction Fund</u>

Mr. James explained the history of the establishment of the Acquisition/Acquisition Fund to the Board. There was discussion in 2019 of looking into re-building this fund. The Finance Committee will be meeting on February 21, 2020 and it would be useful for the Board to provide specific guidance for the future of the fund.

Director Bonkowski said if we do add to this fund, he thinks it should come off the top, before funding of grants. He thinks we need a policy to set up amount to be designated to increase fund when working on the draft of the annual budget for grant funding.

Director Schank said that designating \$25,000 a year to build fund would be a lot to take away from grants. Mr. James discussed the provided list of possible projects that would come out of this fund. Currently the fund is short by half of the funds needed. He suggests we try to increase the funds by a minimum of \$75,000 over the next 10 years as a manageable goal.

Director Penzel thinks it is important that this fund lets us complete actual projects versus preforming studies. Director Bonkowski suggests the amounts on the list may not be accurate as prices have probably gone up. Director Jacobs wonders why the city does not pay for certain projects on the list, such as pipelines, instead of CWSD. Mr. James says there are multiple entities and elements to each project that benefits the watershed. There is a policy in place with required guidelines for using these funds. Director Giomi thinks it is critical that it is of regional benefit and that we are a bridge with local agencies that we partner with for these projects. This is a good way to spend these funds.

Director Schank stated the Finance Committee needs guidance. To take money off the top cuts out smaller districts asking for funding. This is important and needs to be weighed in this discussion. We must balance small and larger projects.

Mr. James said we will need to cut \$300,000 on Friday to meet all funding requests. Director Penzel thinks it is important to keep fund growing to handle big ticket projects that need to be done. We also need county input, referring to each Director, on what your priorities are. Director Bonkowski stated we definitely need better communication on what projects are most

important to each county.

Director Schank states that money we fund to specific counties should be coordinated with county commissioners. If priorities are aligned, we can make sure we are all on the same page. Director Bonkowski said that Directors should educate staff on projects with regional benefit so they can clearly communicate with conservation districts and Public Works.

Director Schank said we should start planning earlier and have Directors speak to their Commissioners regarding projects CWSD is considering and use this input to edit and shape our wish list. If we start the process sooner, we can have a CWSD representative from the Finance Committee meet with Commissioners to educate and get input on city projects. Mr. James mentioned that starting the process earlier would be difficult since we do not get information from the State until February/March.

Director Giomi asks how would it affect the grant funds if we take \$75,000 off the top this year? Mr. James responds that we already have to cut \$300,000 from the current requests. Director Giomi thinks \$75,000 is reasonable. Director Jacobs thinks it should be a specific year decision based on proposed projects and priority ranking by the Board. Director Schank wonders if we can plan on giving bigger grants over multiple years. Director Penzel responds that it causes an accounting problem such as projects that get delayed over several years. Director Schank thinks long-term projects would be a plus. Director Thaler states that living in Nevada we must be able to deal with flood situations too. He agrees we need to take \$75,000 off the top.

Director Bonkowski made a motion to direct the Finance Committee to prioritize putting aside \$75,000 per year for the Construction/Acquisition Fund. The motion was seconded by Director Schank and unanimously approved by the Board.

## <u>Item # 10 - For Possible Action: Authorize staff to pursue the possibility of Storey and Alpine County to officially join CWSD through Nevada Legislation</u>

Mr. James introduced the discussion and noted that Storey County Commissioners had already submitted their letter requesting for CWSD to move forward. Director Schank stated he was Chairman six years ago and had tried to make this happen. He thinks it is a great thing and applauds Committee Member Osborne for helping to make this happen. Director Penzel asked what about Alpine County? Committee Member Jardine responded that Alpine County Commissioners passed this unanimously, too, and he was delivering the official letter requesting CWSD to move forward tonight.

Director Thaler stated Douglas County pays via Ad Valorem taxes. How would Storey County pay? Committee Member Osborne said Storey County would contribute through its General Fund without increasing taxes. It would be a General Fund expenditure.

Mr. James explained the Ad Valorem Tax amount that counties pay is 3 cents per \$100 Property tax. Storey County would pay the same amount, just the amount would come out of their General Fund. They would establish a baseline for payment based on the same calculation. It is a priority to make Storey County a full Director with all the same rights and benefits as the other county directors. This letter asking to move forward is the first step in this process.

Committee Member Osborne explains to the Board that Storey County is affected differently that other counties since the river does not touch Storey County. This would be a possible way



to approach paying it differently, but it is firm there will be no new taxes to pay for this in Storey County. It will be a General Fund expenditure only.

Director Schank stated it is good that we begin this process early. If we start now, we should be ready during the next legislative session.

Director Giomi made a motion to authorize beginning the process through Nevada State legislation (and California State legislation if necessary) to make Committee Members in Alpine and Storey Counties full Directors of the Carson Water Subconservancy District with all of the same rights and benefits therein. The motion was seconded by Director Thaler and unanimously approved by the Board.

## <u>Item # 11 - For Possible Action: Approve the various projects for the next round of FEMA funding in 2020</u>

Mr. James explained the FEMA projects that have been recommended by the FEMA Charter meeting for FEMA MAS 11 funding and their priority order. Director Penzel had requested that staff bring forth for Board approval the recommendations of the FEMA Charter group prior to requesting FEMA funding.

Director Schank made a motion to authorize staff to utilize the provided projects list for the FEMA MAS 11 funding request. The motion was seconded by Director Jacobs and unanimously approved by the Board.

## <u>Item # 12 - For Possible Action: Authorize Staff to sign the funding agreement with NDEP for Carson River UAS Modeling and Monitoring</u>

Director Penzel reported he learned at the NWRA Conference in Las Vegas, that the Clark County Flood District has an annual budget of over \$100 million. He described how they use drones to complete studies for them. CWSD would have to buy the right software to do this with a drone. The software would have modeling built into it. We would need to check with FEMA if this would meet their specific requirements. Mr. James will find out more details on how Clark County Flood District is using drones.

Under this program, CWSD would get a grant from NDEP to use a drone to monitor river projects. The grant would cover all of CWSD's costs.

Mr. James explains the project list benefits to the Board and a discussion follows. This technology is used by developers and many counties.

Director Thaler made a motion to authorize staff to sign the funding Agreement with NDEP for the Carson River UAS Modeling and Monitoring Project. The motion was seconded by Director Penzel and unanimously approved by the Board.

### <u>Item #13 – For Discussion Only: Update on the 2020 Water Year Runoff Projections</u>

Mr. James gave a Power Point presentation to the Board on the 2020 Water Year Runoff Projections highlighting the significantly dry winter season.

The report lists the residential and commercial water rates and includes base rates, usage rates, and connection and stormwater fees charged by each purveyor in the Carson River Watershed.

# 2020 Water and Sewer Rates in the Carson River Watershed

### Introduction:

The central purpose of Carson Water Subconservancy District's (CWSD) advisory report "Water and Sewer Rates in the Carson River Watershed" is to collect and publish the water and sewer rate data of the 13 major water purveyors in our watershed. This report is made available to each water purveyor and to the general public via our website <a href="https://www.cwsd.org">www.cwsd.org</a>.

We appreciate the time and effort water purveyor staff members in providing and checking the data in this report:

This report includes a water data sheet followed by a sewer data sheet for each water purveyor. On the water rate data sheet, general information about each water entity includes:

- service area population
- annual demand
- total service connections separated into customer classes
- percentage of metered and unmetered connections
- Number of re-use connections
- bill frequency
- unidentified system losses
- if entity has a conservation plan and reason for doing so
- date the current water rate became effective

Water rates include base rate and volume charge for water for both residential and commercial users (Appendix A). In addition, connection fees and storm water fees are also listed if applicable. Highlights of changes in water rates follow in the next section, Summary of Water Rate Changes.

Sewer rates are included for each water purveyor in Appendix B. Minden Gardnerville Sanitation District (MGSD) provides sewer service to Gardnerville Ranchos General Improvement District, Gardnerville Water Company, and Town of Minden. MGSD bills Gardnerville and Minden residents directly. However, Gardnerville Ranchos General Improvement District, through an agreement with MGSD, collects sewer fees. The Stagecoach General Improvement District service area only has septic systems; therefore, sewer rates are not applicable. Lyon County provides sewer service in two areas of the county: Dayton, Moundhouse area and within Silver Springs Mutual Water Company's service area.

For information purposes, Truckee Meadow Water Authority's (TMWA) water rates, are included in this report. TMWA also has different rate schedules for former service areas of STMGID and Washoe County. TMWA's latest rate schedule can be accessed via their website, <a href="https://tmwa.com/">https://tmwa.com/</a>, or from hyperlinks listed on the bottom of TMWA's rate sheet page in Appendix A.

## Summary of Water Rate Changes:

Several entities increased their water rates over the past year. Of these, several water purveyor's boards have approved water rate increases for multiple years. Indian Hills GID, Stagecoach GID, and Storey County continue to increase water rates annually. Douglas County voted in July 2019 to increase rates annually, but they will not take effect until 7/1/2020. Lyon County also approved annual rate increase effective 7/1 but also included a one-time rate increase on 1/1/2020. Carson City presents proposal to increase rates annually in March 2020. Table 2.1 summarizes water rate changes as of 1/1/2020.

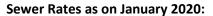

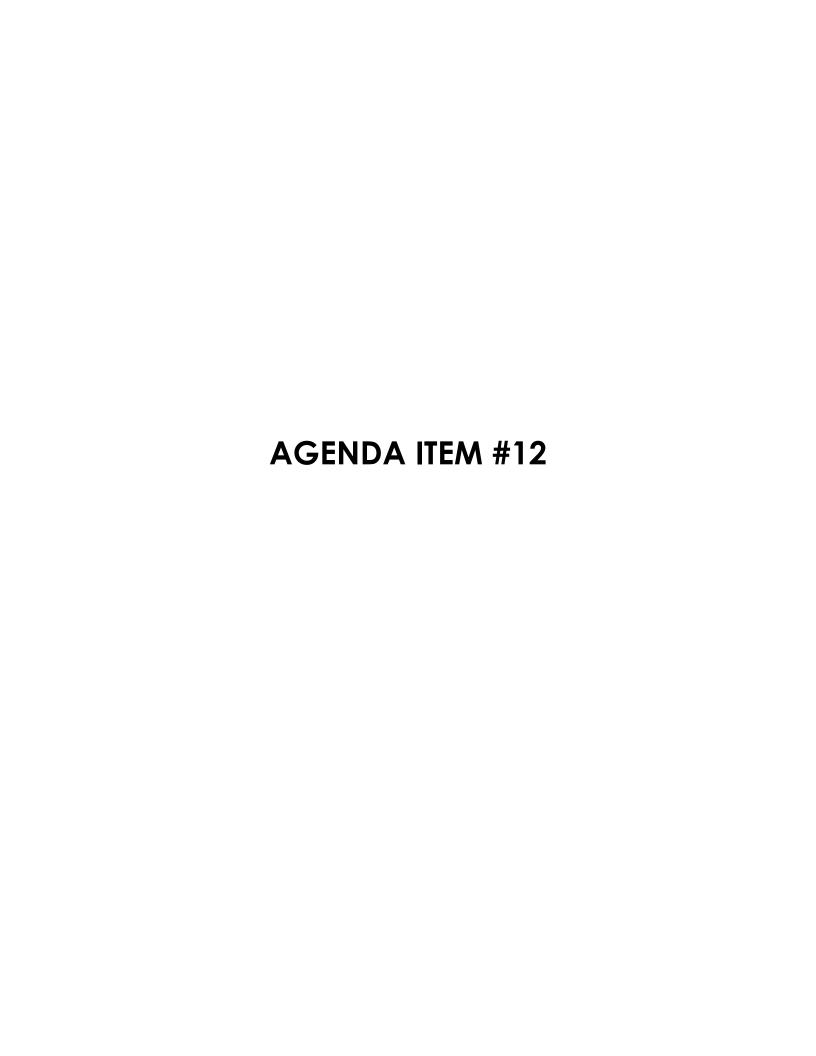

**DISCUSSION:** On February 21, 2020, the CWSD Finance Committee reviewed the proposed Tentative Budgets for FY 2020-21. The committee spent more than half the day reviewing the proposed budget and listening to funding requests from various entities in the watershed (see attached draft meeting minutes). The committee had to cut over \$269,000 from the funding requests to balance the budget. Based on the discussion at the meeting, attached are the proposed tentative budgets as recommended by the Finance Committee for FY 2020-21 for the General Fund, Acquisition/Construction Fund, and Floodplain Management Fund. <a href="CLICK HERE">CLICK HERE</a> to link to the projects presented.

Each of the tentative budgets is divided into three columns. The left column shows the proposed budget for FY 2020-21, the center column shows the adopted budget for FY 2019-20, and the right column shows the projected actual income and expenses for FY 2019-20. For the General Fund Tentative Budget, the numbers in blue are grant funds. The draft budget includes transferring \$145,000 to the Acquisition/Construction Fund. This amount is greater than the \$75,000 discussed at the February Board meeting. The reason for this increase is there may be a request for funding out of the Acquisition/Construction Fund that was cut from the General Fund.

Attached is a pie chart that shows the percentage of expenses in the General Fund by categories of Administration, Projects, Studies, Programs, Projects Funded by Grants, Programs Funded by Grants, and Studies Funded by Grants.

The projected income from Ad Valorem taxes is staff's best guess. The actual projected tax figures from the State will not be available until March 25. Since this report from the State comes out after the board meeting, staff is recommending that the State projection for Ad Valorem taxes be inserted before the Tentative Budgets are sent to the State.

**FINANCE COMMITTEE & STAFF RECOMMENDATION:** Approve the FY 2020-21 Tentative Budgets for the Acquisition/Construction Fund and the Floodplain Management Fund as presented; and approve the General Fund with the Department of Taxation Ad Valorem tax figures to be inserted when they become available.

The meeting was called to order at 8:30 a.m. by Committee Member Schank. The meeting was held in the Conference Room of the Carson Water Subconservancy District, 777 E. William St., #110, Carson City, Nevada. A quorum of the Finance Committee was present.

Item #2 - Public comment: None

Item #3 - Discussion for possible action regarding approval of the minutes from the Finance Committee meeting on February 28, 2019: Committee Member Griffith made the motion to approve the minutes of the Finance Committee meeting on February 28, 2019. The motion was seconded by Committee Member Workman and approved unanimously.

Item #4 - Discussion regarding the Tentative General Fund FY 2020-21 Budget and hear presentations for proposed projects; review the Tentative Acquisition/Construction Fund FY 2020-21 Budget; and review the Tentative Floodplain Management Fund FY 2020-21 Budget:

Mr. James explained the General Fund Budget spreadsheet and the committee process. The committee will reach consensus on budget recommendations to be brought to full Board for action at the March 18, 2020 meeting. The funds granted need to be for projects enhancing the watershed. For clarification, FEMA & NDEP Grants have specific requirement and these funds cannot be diverted to other projects.

Director Schank asks about the focus of funding going to studies vs projects. Mr. James explains prior to his joining CWSD most of funding requests went to studies of storage on Carson River, but the past 21 years there has been push for projects and that has been the main focus. Committee Member Griffith says studies need to be included for projects. Director Workman asks if there are specific requirement to specific grants to which Mr. James responds yes, for instance most FEMA grants are for studies only. It's important to know that studies are valuable to future projects and our partners.

Director Schank states looking at Budget pie chart, our percentages of how we spend our funds look great! He suggests the amounts spent on programs and projects are over half our budget and should be moved next to each other on the pie chart to emphasize this. Discussion follows regarding distribution of funds for studies vs projects and gathering data. Mr. James points out the use of funds for administration show CWSD as an organization is lean.

Mr. James presented his proposed budgets and announced we will need to cut \$267,000 from the grant funding for FY 2020-21. Director Penzel asked Mr. James if we have any liability issues with Mud Lake. The answer is no, because we don't put water into the lake. Mr. James gave a brief history of CWSD and Mud Lake.

Turning back to the proposed 2020-21 budget and starting in the income section, Mr. James explained that the proposed county taxes are based on a conservative 3.5% increase over last year, but the official numbers from the state will not be available until March 25. The increase may be as high as 5.5%, but we will base our proposed tentative budget at 3.5%. He further explained grant income and interest income on the spreadsheet. On the expense side, he noted an increase in salary based the assumption of a 2% cost of living and a merit increase, benefit cost increases due to health insurance changes with staff and increase in PERS contribution.

Mr. James reviewed the continuing, multi-year projects and grants, as well as all the grant expenses that are offset by the grant income. He also noted that it is required by law that there be a minimum 4% of expenses in our ending balance.

# **Presentations of Proposed Projects**

# **Carson River Projects:**

<u>Carson Valley Conservation District - Bioengineering, Maintenance and Debris Removal (Proposal #4)</u>
Mike Hayes, Grant Manager/River Coordinator

Project to stabilize vertical cut banks as needed throughout the Carson Valley. These cut banks have migrated faster than usual because of the two flooding incidents that we experienced in 2017. The goal would be to use bio-engineering techniques to stabilize the soil, improve water quality and re-establish desirable vegetation. CVCD would like to continue our work on channel maintenance and woody debris removal throughout the Carson River. CVCD would like to partner with CWSD, CTWCD, NDWR and Douglas County to complete this river work by the summer of 2021. **Funding request: \$85,000** 

<u>Carson Valley Conservation District – Westwood Channel Clear, Snag, Maint & Bio (Proposal #5)</u> Rich Wilkinson, Grant Manager/River Coordinator CWSD Finance Committee February 21, 2020 DRAFT Minutes

CVCD will attempt to restore river function along a 1.25 miles section of the East Fork of the Carson River. The overall goal of this project would be to use bio-engineering techniques to stabilize the soil, improve water quality and re-establish desirable vegetation for wildlife. In addition to bioengineering, CVCD will perform channel clearing, snagging and maintenance work in this area which was impacted by recent flooding events. The district considers this project a high priority since this area was severely impacted in 2017 and is close to the Westwood subdivision. CVCD would like to partner with CWSD, CTWCD, NDOW, USFWS, Douglas County and NDEP to complete this river maintenance project by the winter of 2021. **Funding request: \$100,000** 

# <u>Dayton Valley Conservation District – Fort Churchill MCR 049 Bank Stabilization (Proposal #6)</u> Rob Holley, District Manager

MCR 049 is a streambank stabilization in the area of Fort Churchill State Historic Park, and in close proximity to the Buckland Ditch and Fort Churchill Road. The stabilization project is approximately 1,100 linear feet, to a height of 12', with two rock refusal trenches (at the up and downstream ends), nine stream barbs approx. 50'long by 8.5' tall, and erosion matting over 6,000 sq. ft. Additionally, 225 willow/cottonwood pole plantings will be utilized, along with reseeding of the bank and upland portions of the project. Immediately adjacent to the Buckland Ditch and Fort Churchill Roads, MCR 049 is vitally important in the protection of this critical pieces of infrastructure. In addition to infrastructure protection, MCR 049 will reduce and trap sediment, increase native vegetation, and promote improved water quality and wildlife habitat along this stretch of river. **Funding request: \$90,000** 

#### River Wranglers- Conserve the Carson River Workdays (Proposal #1)

Darcy Phillips, Executive Director

River Wranglers (RW) continues the Conserve the Carson River Workdays (CCRWD) throughout the watershed. In the 2019 year, RW worked with 15 elementary schools (an increase of 3 schools) and 8 high schools in the watershed. RW worked with 6,655 people in the watershed, approximately 6,000 of which were students (as opposed to adults). Of these contacts, approximately 2,275 are unique individuals. Bringing these students to the river is an important part of our work - approximately 50% of the students we work with have never seen the river.

RW plans to continue the good work of prior years with tree wrapping, water quality testing, marking storm drains, cleaning up trash, and working on stream bank stabilization. RW is requesting \$6,000 per county for these projects. RW uses local conservation district employees to supervise and prep for these river projects. In addition, RW works with city, state, federal, and county partners. The remaining \$2,000 would cover administration and travel costs related to the grant. **Funding request: \$26,000** 

# <u>Sierra Nevada Journeys – Family Watershed Nights for Carson River WS Communities (Proposal #2)</u> Sean Hill, Education Director

Funding from CWSD will serve over 500 children and their parents in communities within the Carson River Watershed with four community-building and educational events called Family Watershed Nights (FWN). FWNs invite K-8 students, their parents and siblings to attend a fun, family-friendly evening, which provides watershed education at the family level and reinforces STEM concepts in the classroom. Through hands-on activities, participants will gain a sense of ownership and stewardship for the health of their community watershed. **Funding request: \$3,278.88** 

## Alpine County Watershed Group- Upper Carson River Watershed Programs (Proposal #3)

Kimra McAfee, Executive Director

AWG's mission is to preserve and enhance the natural system functions of Alpine County's watersheds for future generations. For nearly 20 years, AWG has organized volunteers and inspired community participation to address water quality monitoring and restoration needs in Alpine County. To further the stewardship of our county's natural resources, our organization has developed diverse partnerships

around watershed issues. Through this project, AWG will staff: 1) involve local citizens in watershed stewardship; 2) plan and implement watershed monitoring and restoration activities; 3) recruit diverse stakeholders and strengthen community partnerships; and 4) support local watershed education and community outreach. **Funding request: \$25,000** 

#### <u>Lahontan Conservation District – Lower Carson River Clearing & Snagging (Proposal #7)</u>

Christy Sullivan, District Manager

Project to prevent and minimize property loss and other damage during flood condition. Also to maintain a clear channel to enable citizens to utilize the river for recreation and maintaining river flow velocity to prevent stagnant pools that pose health risks. Includes removal of dead vegetation and debris, beavers and beaver dams and clearing brush and sediment back to original riverbank starting at Diversion Dam and continuing downstream. Removing sediment build up above and below Sheckler Bridge, McLean Bridge, Highway 50 Bridge, Highway 95 Bridge, Bafford Bridge and repairing eroded embankments along the river. **Funding request: \$20,000** 

Director Schank remarks that maintenance of the Highway 50 Bridge is very important for flood issues in the area. A discussion follows regarding a need for a sediment removal/diversion structure study to reach a long-term plan to address these issues permanently.

## Vidler Water Company – Highway 50 Right-of-Way Acquisition Project (Proposal #10)

Dave Merrill & Dorothy Palmer

The proposed 2-3 Year project is to obtain the requisite right-of-way along the Highway 50 corridor for a future utility/water pipeline between Dayton and Silver Springs. The work would involve researching and identifying existing easements and utilities; determining the best route that benefits the most amount of people, the most cost effective and least disruptive; and obtaining approvals from the affected governmental entities such as the Bureau of Land Management and the Nevada Department of Transportation. The right-a-way and future pipeline would further the connectivity between the two communities and allow for the modernization of water service. Once completed, the pipeline could serve the daily needs of the communities as well as assist in times of water shortage and emergencies. **Funding request: \$129,000** 

#### Carson City – Kings & Ash Canyon Watershed Control Plan (Proposal #11)

Eddy Quaglieri, Water Utility Manager

The Quill Ranch Water Treatment Facility (Quill WTP) was completed and commissioned in 1991. The plant is supplied by three surface water sources when available; Ash Creek, King's Creek and springs, and the Marlette Hobart Water System owned and operated by the State of Nevada. The beautiful Kings and Ash Canyons are becoming more and more popular amongst the public. These two Canyons provide Carson City clean and sustainable drinking water within the Carson River Watershed as well as recreation opportunities for the public. There are now world renown mountain biking and hiking trails in the two canyons as well as increasingly amount public use. The purpose of this project is to develop a Watershed Control Plan to help keep the City's drinking water supplies safe and sustainable, while still allowing the public to enjoy the open spaces. The goal is to create a living document that outlines the many different uses and stakeholders of Kings and Ash Creeks as well as the certain safeguards needed in keeping the watersheds healthy. This project would be in compliance with the Nevada Division of Environmental Protection's Long Term 2 Treatment Rule that monitors for Cryptosporidium in source waters. **Funding request: \$25,000** 

## <u>Truckee-Carson Irrigation District - Gates at Churchill CR Diversion Dam Repairs (Proposal # 8)</u>

Rusty Jardine, General Manager

Improvement/Repair to four (4) Carson River gates at Carson River Diversion Dam, consisting of refurbishing the slide gates to original dimensions, replacing deteriorated wooden gate seats, and cleaning/recoating slide gates. This would enhance the operational ability of designated river gates at the Carson River Diversion Dam to safely convey as much as 2,000 cfs of water during flood operations as declared for the Newlands Federal Reclamation Project by the United States Bureau of Reclamation.

Funding request: \$100,000

#### Churchill County Parks & Recreation – Carson River Park Phase I (Proposal #9)

Jorge Guerrero, Director

Churchill County Parks and Recreation Department has acquired a 2.26 Acre property at the intersection of Sheckler Cut Off and the Carson River approximately 5 miles west of Fallon. The purchase was made possible using Question 1 Funds in 2005. In 2011, funds were awarded through the Carson Water Subconservancy District for a preliminary plan. In 2012 a plan was developed. The parcel includes approximately 420 feet of river frontage with another 140 feet possible. Funds being requested would be used to carry out the 1st phase of the overall project. The 1st phase would include demolishing of the current house on the property. The parcel would lend itself well to a day use picnic area use, interpretive site potential and river access for recreational use of the river. The main goal is to provide the community the ability to access the Carson River. **Funding request: \$10,537.50** 

#### **USGS**:

#### **USGS Middle Carson Groundwater Monitoring (Proposal #12)**

Ron Kauble, Hydrologic Technician

4-Year Project with 50% Match: The proposed study is aligned with the USGS science strategy goal of informing the public and decision makers about the status of freshwater resources across the US and is consistent with the goal of the USGS Strategic Plan of providing water- resource managers with accurate, reliable, and impartial scientific information. The data will provide an increased understanding of groundwater levels in Eagle, Dayton, and Churchill Valleys and provide water managers with information on how water resources are affected by increased development. Project benefits include: (1) Groundwater-level observations in approximately 220 wells. Additional monitoring wells will be included near areas of proposed expansion with the USA Parkway Highway with the addition of at least 3 monitoring wells. Sites will be monitored at quarterly (61 wells) and annual (159 wells) frequency. The network will be dynamic and adjust to best monitor issues reported to the USGS during the project timeline. (2) The continued collection of bulk precipitation on McClellan Peak, Brunswick Canyon, Churchill Butte, and in the Virginia Range, for future use in potential groundwater model scenario development. (3) Publish and maintain data online for public use in the USGS National Water Inventory System database. Funding request: \$61,000 (\$15,250 per year x4 years)

#### **USGS Carson Valley Groundwater Study (Proposal #13)**

Ramon Naranjo, Research Hydrologist

3-Year Project with 35% Match: This proposed work documents (1) the status of water levels, arsenic and nitrate in groundwater, (2) evaluates the current well network efficacy for monitoring arsenic and nitrate in the Carson Valley, and (3) development of a web-based tool for tracking changes in hydrologic data collected in the Carson River watershed. The study will analyze seasonal and annual trends in water levels, nitrates and arsenic in the alluvial aquifer to provide an up to date assessment of water quantity and quality. This study also proposes to develop a web-based application to allow water managers and the public to get near-real time information on the status and trends of data as it is being collected for the Carson Basin. **Funding request:** \$103,192 (\$31,105/\$41,079/\$30,964)

## **New Projects:**

#### Desert Research Institute - Stream Flow Analysis 1940-2019 (Proposal#14)

Alexandra Lutz

In 2009, DRI reviewed streamflow and climate records from 1940-2009 at locations in the Carson River system for CWSD. We propose revising the review up to include records from 2019. It has been an interesting ten years since the original review: the economy grew and population increased, the area experienced several years of below average precipitation, an above-average "pluvial" year, and some seemingly average years. The 2009 review reported statistically significant trends with respect to spring runoff occurring earlier and increase of temperatures during winter and spring. There were visually discernible trends for snow water equivalent (SWE) that were just outside the statistically significance threshold. The revised review will re-test all trends and include locations that started recording SWE in the early 2000s. The revised review will try to determine if trends are steady, accelerating, or decelerating over time. **Funding request: \$17,931** 

No action was taken.

# <u>Item #5 - Make recommendations for the Tentative General Fund, Acquisition/Construction Fund, and</u> Floodplain Management Fund FY 2019-20 budgets.

During a working lunch, Mr. James reviewed the Acquisition/Construction and Floodplain Management Funds with the committee.

Mr. James reminded the committee there needs to be a cut of \$267,000 from the funding requests. Based on further discussion the committee proposed the following adjustments and cuts:

- Reduce Carson Valley Conservation District/ Bioengineering (4) request by \$20,000
- Reduce Dayton Valley Conservation District FT Churchill Project (6) request by \$15,000
- Reduce TCID Diversion Dam Repairs (8) request by \$85,000

The Committee recommended not funding:

- Churchill County Park
- Carson City Ash/King Watershed Project
- DRI Stream Flow Analysis
- Right-A-Way Analysis in Lyon County USGS Carson Valley GW Study

The Committee also recommended adding \$145,000 to Acquisition/Construction Fund.

Director Schank made a motion that the Finance Committee recommend that the tentative budgets for the General Fund be approved as adjusted above. Committee Member Griffith seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by the Finance Committee.

For the Acquisition/Construction Fund, the Committee suggested that Lyon County submit a funding request for this Right-A-Way Analysis and see if Lyon County can contribute some funding.

Director Penzel made a motion that the Finance Committee recommend that the tentative budgets for the Acquisition/Construction Fund be approved as adjusted above. Director Schank seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by the Finance Committee.

For the Flood Management Fund, the Committee recommended using the funds in the account for

Churchill County Flood Study. These funds were set aside to help cover the costs to do the new flood mapping study, but FEMA is covering all the costs.

Director Schank made a motion that the Finance Committee recommend that the tentative budgets for the Flood Management Fund be approved as adjusted above. Director Penzel seconded the motion which was unanimously approved by the Finance Committee.

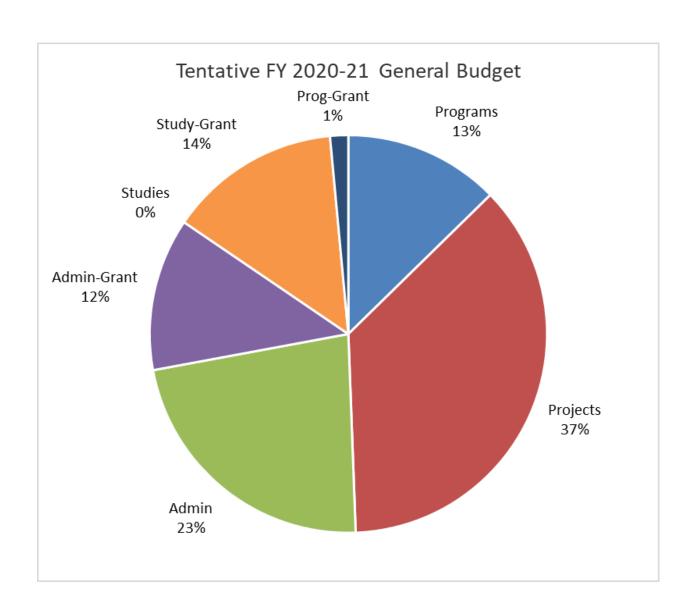

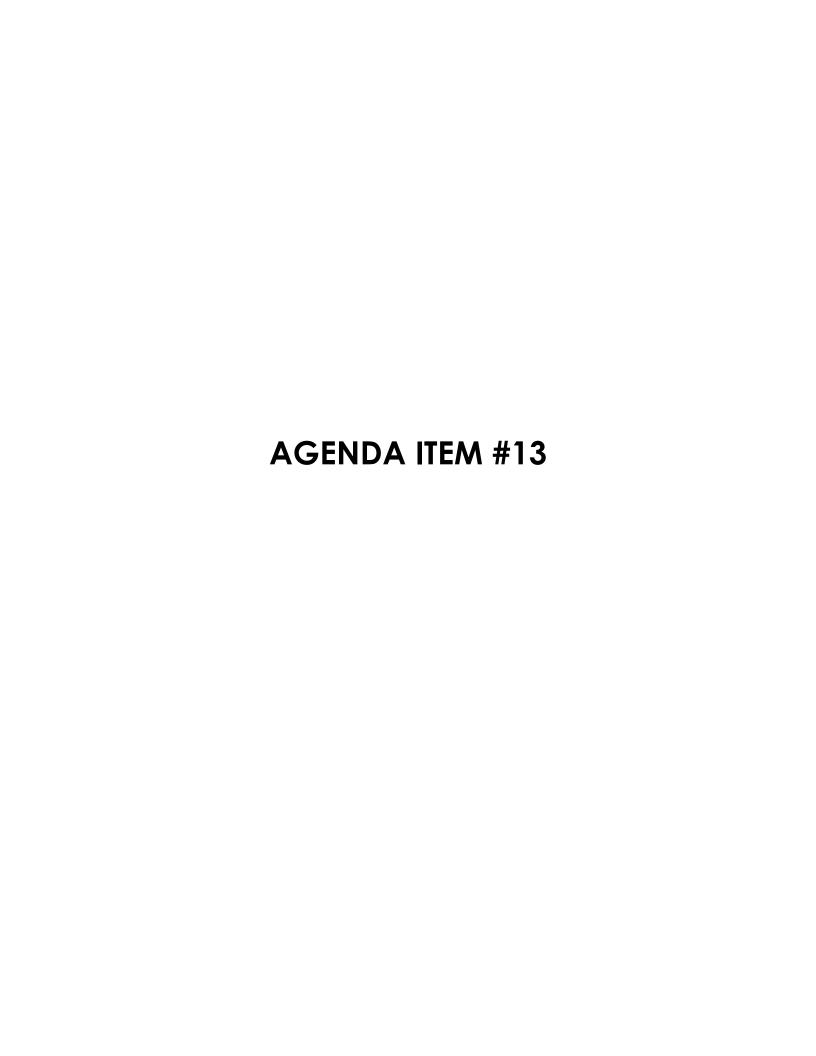

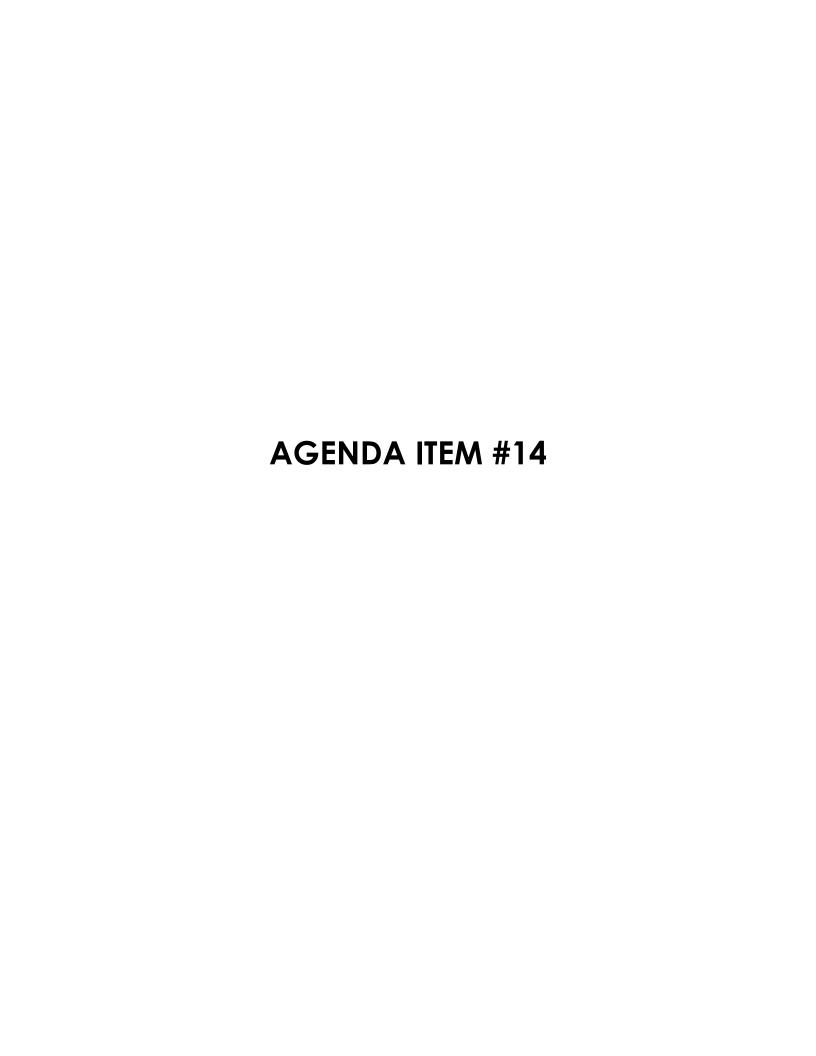

#### Andre "Andy" Aldax January 21, 1934 ~ February 25, 2020

Andre "Andy" Maurice Aldax passed away on Tuesday, February 25, 2020. A native of Carson Valley, Andy was born on January 21, 1934 and lived his entire life on the family farm. He was a 1952 graduate of Douglas County High School, and made a successful living as a hard-working dairy farmer and rancher, and was proud of his Basque heritage.

Throughout his career, he served the agriculture industry in northern Nevada and Carson Valley as a director of the Carson Truckee Conservancy District for more than 20 years; a director of the Carson Water Subconservancy District for 53 years; a director of the Alpine Land & Reservoir Company for more than 30 years; board member and chairman of the Carson Valley Soil Conservation District; board member and chairman of the Upper Allerman-Virginia Ditch Company; member/director of the Douglas County Farm Bureau, American Dairy Association of Nevada and Northern Nevada Dairymen.

He was the first recipient of the Andy Aldax Award for Exemplary Service in Conservation and Protection of the Carson River Watershed. The award continues to be presented annually in his name.

He supported his community as a member of the Carson Valley 20-30 Club; a member and one-term president of the Douglas County School District board of trustees for eight years, and many other local organizations. He was a lifetime member of St. Gall Catholic Church, and a fourth-degree member in the Knights of Columbus Council 12845 Immaculate Heart of Mary Council.

A devoted husband, father and grandfather, he is survived by his wife of 56 years, Carol; his son Mark (Alison), daughter Julie Callahan (Scott), and son Gary; and his grandchildren Lindsey Aldax, Rachel Aldax, Seth Callahan and Lewis Callahan.

He was preceded in death by his parents Bernard and Jeanne Marie Aldax, and two older infant brothers, Jean Leon and Rene.

A memorial mass will be held on Saturday, March 7, 2020 at 10:00 a.m. at St. Gall Catholic Church, 1343 Centerville Lane, Gardnerville, Nevada 89410. A reception will follow in the pastoral center.
