Draft Minutes

The CWSD November 18, 2020 Board of Directors meeting was held via Zoom Videoconference and teleconference due to Governor Sisolak's statewide Emergency Directive in response to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

Director Erquiaga called the meeting of the Carson Water Subconservancy District (CWSD) to order at 6:30 pm. Roll call of the CWSD Board was taken and a quorum was determined to be present.

Director Schank made a motion to approve the agenda as presented. The motion was seconded by Director Thaler and unanimously approved by the Board.

Director Penzel made a motion to approve the Board Meeting Minutes of October 21, 2020. The motion was seconded by Director Jacobs and approved by the Board 12-0-1.

Director Jacobs made a motion to approve Consent Agenda as presented. The motion was seconded by Director Giomi and unanimously approved by the Board.

Item #11 - For Possible Action: Presentation by Eide Bailly on the CWSD FY 2019-20 Audit

Beth Farley and Michael Beers from Eide Bailly, LLC presented the draft report of the Single Audit they performed for FY 2019-20 financial, grant, and contract records. Each page of the report was reviewed in detail to explain their findings to the Board. There was discussion of the issue with FEMA MAS 10 procurement of contractors, which CWSD is currently awaiting a decision by FEMA on how to move forward. Because the issue was discovered during the audit procedure, if a resolution is received from FEMA before the audit submission due date of November 30, 2020, the language will be modified in the audit record.

Director Schank made a motion to accept the CWSD FY 2019-20 Single Audit as presented, with allowing for the addition of any resolution received from FEMA by November 30, 2020. The motion was seconded by Director Jacobs and approved by the Board 10-2-0.

<u>Item #12 - For Possible Action: Modify the process for selecting Officers & Committee Members for 2021</u>

Mr. James explained that next year is unique in that we will have 5-7 new Board Members. They will not be appointed by their counties until January. Because almost half the Board will be new to the Board, Mr. James suggests we wait until our regular January Board meeting to name the Chairperson and Treasurer and select committee assignments. Usually the selection of the Officers would be discussed at the Administrative Committee meeting in December; however, due to the large turn over there is an uncertainty who may be eligible to serve as an Officer.

Director Giomi made a motion to accept the recommendation to waive the Administrative Committee meeting in December and select officers and committee members at the January 20, 2021 Board meeting. The motion was seconded by Committee Member Griffith and unanimously approved by the Board.



Item #13 - For Possible Action: Modify CWSD Procurement Policy

Mr. James explained that the auditors have identified the need to modify CWSD Procurement Policy. The change includes adding in the Code of Federal Regulations Part 200 language as part of CWSD policy.

Director Jacobs made a motion to accept the modification of the CWSD Procurement Policy as presented. The motion was seconded by Director Workman and unanimously approved by the Board.

<u>Item #14 - For Possible Action: Revision to Contractor Agreement Template when using Federal Funds</u>

Mr. James explained that this revision to the contractor agreement template to incorporate the language of Appendix II to Part 200—Contract Provisions for Non-Federal Entity Contracts Under Federal Awards under our Section 7: Independent Contractor, was recommended by our auditor.

Director Thaler made a motion to accept the Revision to Contractor Agreement Template when using Federal Funds as presented. The motion was seconded by Director Schank and unanimously approved by the Board.

Item #15 – For Discussion Only: Staff Reports –

Mr. James reported on the following:

- Staff will be meeting with Eide Bailly to discuss some issues that came up regarding how the audit was conducted this year. Staff is also considering beginning the process of hiring a new accountant/consultant so CWSD will be better prepared for a single audit in the future.
- Although we are still waiting for a resolution from FEMA as stated earlier, CWSD was
 given authority to move forward with the projects that had already been started under
 FEMA MAS 10. They had been previously halted pending resolution.
- BDR: Steve Walker and Mary Walker talked with State Senator James Settelmeyer about introducing a bill regarding Storey County becoming a member of CWSD. Mr. Walker expressed some concerns adding Alpine County into the bill at this time. He recommends that we move forward with Storey County now and address Alpine County later. There was concern among the Board and discussion including that we should set up a meeting with Mr. Settelmeyer to clarify exactly what the issues are. Committee Member Griffith offered to attend the meeting. Mr. James reminded the Board that Storey County is not yet official, but Alpine County is under authority of a yearly Memorandum of Understanding.
- Douglas County is in the process of updating their Master Plan. The Planning Commission
 has recommended removing the Stewardship Plan from the Master Plan. Their concern
 is none of them has seen the Stewardship Plan. Staff realizes that there are many new
 people in the watershed, and it is important to start going to each of the counties to give
 them an update on the various regional water studies and plans. Hope to start meeting
 with the various counties in early 2021.



 December Board meeting will not be our usual Christmas Party this year due to COVID, but we are planning to recognize our departing Board Members in our customary friendly roast way.

- Director Bonkowski reported the multi-use path along the river has been completed. The Commissioners will hear the new storm drainage rates tomorrow. The new rate will generate about \$1 million a year and will help with point source pollution.
- Director Jacobs just wanted to mention that the Douglas County Chamber of Commerce would like Mr. James to speak to their group regarding water issues.

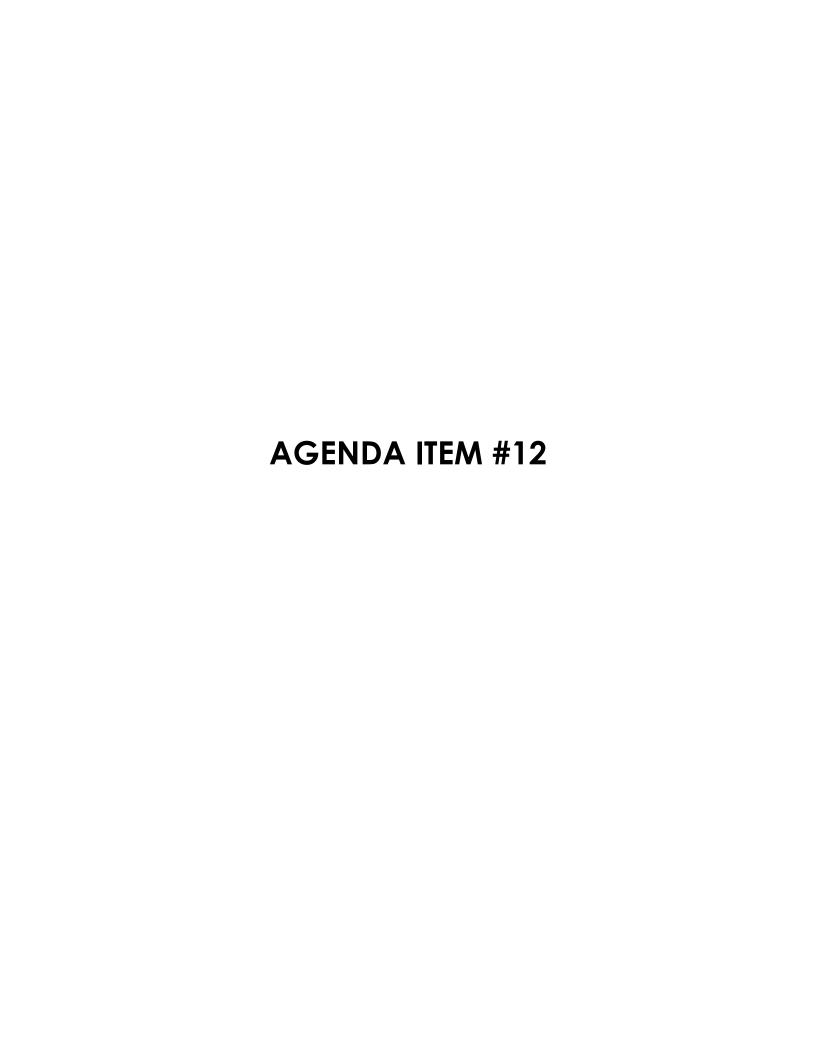

Who We Are

The Carson Water Subconservancy District's mission is to promote cooperative action across agency and political boundaries in the Carson River Watershed, using integrated watershed management.


Carson Water Subconservancy District (CWSD) strives to balance the municipal, agricultural, and environmental water needs of our watershed. We work with our watershed partners using an integrated watershed planning process to reach our goals of a sustainable, healthy watershed. To achieve this balance, CWSD integrates planning, coordinating, and management activities to support projects associated with floodplain management, river projects, water quality, water supply, invasive species, outreach and education, and recreation.

Accomplishments and activities in 2020 included the following:

- CWSD staff planned and facilitated monthly CWSD Board meetings and periodic CWSD Committee meetings, all of which met open meeting law requirements.
- CWSD staff followed various water issues and concerns at local, regional, and state water meetings and communicated them to the CWSD Board of Directors.
- CWSD staff made annual presentations to county, city, and water purveyor boards updating each board on work accomplished and current projects, programs, and studies in the Carson River Watershed.
- CWSD's General Manager served on the Carson Truckee Water Conservancy District Board of Directors & the Nevada Water Resource Association Board of Directors.
- CWSD published an updated <u>"2020 CWSD Overview" video</u>.
- CWSD is following up on the spectacular "<u>I am Carson River Watershed</u>" video with a Community Drinking Water PSA video featuring voices of the local community. This new PSA will be available in early 2021.
- CWSD applied for and were awarded three federal grants: one from Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), and two from Environmental Protection Agency through Nevada Division of Environmental Protection.
- CWSD was awarded the 2020 Golden Pinecone Sustainability Award from GREENevada.

Grant Administration

CWSD leveraged federal funding over 5:1 with federal dollars. In FY 2020 staff administered grant implementation of the following regional projects totaling \$1,131,188.

Carson River Coalition Watershed Coordination Program

The Carson River Coalition (CRC) Watershed Coordination Program funding has been continued through June 2022. The Watershed Program Manager and Specialist continue to manage the Carson River Coalition (CRC) efforts relating to water quality, floodplain management, invasive species, and environmental education and outreach outlined throughout this document. Accomplishments include:

- Managed grants including National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF), NDEP for Watershed Coordination, Watershed-Literacy, Low Impact Development, and new this year, the Carson River Drone Monitoring Program.
- Organized several CRC Working Group meetings throughout the year addressing environmental outreach and education, river and floodplain, invasive species, water quality and recreation issues.
- Planned, coordinated, and held 2-day CRC Watershed Management Forum at WNC in March 2020.
- Began filming for Community Drinking Water PSA.
- Coordinated and published bi-annual Watershed Connections newsletter.
- Communicated using our e-blast system to our CRC email list of nearly 900 individuals providing our newsletter and information on events, grant funding, trainings, and other relevant watershed information.
- Coordinated social media outreach Facebook, Instagram and our YouTube channel.
- Updated CWSD's website.
- Maintained our office as an AmeriCorps Host Site through Truckee Meadows Parks Foundation's State

AmeriCorps Program. Hosted two AmeriCorps members during 2020 as Watershed Technicians within the Watershed Coordination Program.



Water Supply

Activities conducted by CWSD in 2020 to facilitate a reliable water supply include:

- Worked on US Bureau of Reclamation water market (transfer/exchange) plan for the Carson River Watershed and identified potential storage alternatives in the Watershed. Project continues through 2021.
- CWSD funded 10 USGS Streamflow Gages on the Carson River.
- CWSD funded USGS Water Level Data Collection throughout the watershed.
- CWSD staff assisted Alpine County with its Groundwater Elevation Water Level Data Collection Monitoring Program (CASGEM) & Groundwater

Monitoring on the Mesa above the south end of Carson Valley (Mesa).

- CWSD Staff created an advisory report of water and sewer rates of the 13 major water purveyors in the Carson River Watershed.
- CWSD Staff reviewed & corrected State Engineers Groundwater Pumping Reports & Federal Water Diversion Records.
- CWSD staff sponsored a virtual workshop dealing with Water Resource Issues.



Activities conducted by CWSD in 2020 to facilitate effective water quality management included:

- CWSD continued to promote the use of Low Impact Development (LID) methods and the adoption of LID ordinances to address polluted runoff issues in our urban environment.
- CWSD funded USGS Churchill County Groundwater Level and Water Quality Study.
- CWSD provided an outreach platform for EPA regarding the Carson River Mercury Superfund site at our annual forum and continues to coordinate with EPA during their environmental site review process.
- Staff coordinated with the USFS and Friends of Hope Valley regarding ecosystem damage and overuse in the Carson East Fork Hot Springs area.



Activities conducted by CWSD in 2020 to facilitate effective floodplain management included:

- Facilitated CRC Floodplain Management Working Group meetings. Staff is working with counties to improve Floodplain Management Plan to help increase community rating system scores for Carson City, Douglas, and Storey Counties.
- Completed FEMA MAS #9 floodplain projects and hazard mitigation projects forged ahead to create South Dayton Valley Area Drainage Master Plan; North Carson City Drainage Study Restudy and Remapping of Pinenut Wash; HEC-RAS Model Update for Carson Valley; Public Outreach and Education; and an update or creation of Floodplain Ordinances for each county in the Carson River Watershed.
- FEMA MAS #10 floodplain and hazard mitigation projects are in process. The projects in this grant include: Phase 1 of Ruhenstroth Area Drainage Master Plan; West Carson City Drainage Study; Physical Map Revision of Carson River below Lahontan Dam in Churchill County; Finalize Comments on Carson Valley Physical Map Revision HEC-RAS Model Update; and Public Outreach and Education.
- Obtained FEMA MAS #11 funding for floodplain and hazard mitigation projects. Projects in this grant include: Phase
 2 to complete Ruhenstroth Area Drainage Master Plan; Smelter Creek Letter of Map Revision (LOMR); Clear Creek
 LOMR; Web Access System; and Public Outreach and Education.

- Assisted with coordination of the annual Nevada Flood Awareness (FAW) Week, Nov. 14-20, 2020. Designed and funded newspaper ads for FAW and NevadaFloods.org campaign. CWSD staff helped create the Know Your Risk National Weather Service video for their social media outreach.
- Participated with USACE for Phase 2 of Alluvial Fan project to provide flood hazard information on several alluvial fans in Douglas County and Carson City.
- Provided Storey County, Carson City, and Douglas County with National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Community Rating System Reports.
- Assisted Douglas County with Stormwater Management Activity Reporting.
- CWSD's General Manager was recognized as the 2020 Floodplain Manager of the Year for the Floodplain Management Association's CA/NV/HI region.



Activities conducted by CWSD in 2020 to facilitate effective invasive species management:

- Distributed \$75,000 to CWMAs (Cooperative Weed Management Areas), Conservation Districts and Counties.
- Completed implementation of National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) grant to increase the amount of weed treatments conducted in the watershed. Over 2200 acres treated.
- Coordinated with Cooperative Weed Management Areas to support weed management throughout the watershed.
- Held a CRC invasive species working group meeting with federal, state, and local partners to better coordinate weed eradication efforts.




Activities funded by CWSD in 2020 to facilitate river restoration included:

- Provided funding for the Carson Valley Stream Bank Restoration Projects.
- Provided funding for River Restoration Projects in Dayton Valley.
- Provided funding for Lahontan Conservation District to conduct channel clearance projects in Churchill County.
- Staff coordinated with Alpine Watershed Group (AWG) on their Hope Valley Restoration project, Carson River Stewardship Plan project planning and implementation updates, and the West Fork Carson River Vision planning process which included CA Lahontan Water Quality Board.
- Staff coordinated with American Rivers, USFS, AWG and others on the proposed Faith Valley Beaver Analog project.
- Provided funding to River Wranglers for Conserve Carson River Workdays projects throughout the watershed.
- Staff initiated UAS/Drone program to document riverine damage and monitor projects.



Activities conducted by CWSD in 2020 to provide outreach and education included:

- Continued the "<u>I AM Carson River Watershed</u>" Campaign including the Walk through the Watershed videos in English & Spanish and the logo sticker distribution. Both were promoted on social media and traditional media throughout 2020.
- Monitored watershed boundary signs in the Nevada portion of the watershed.
- Completed and launched the updated "<u>2020 CWSD Overview</u>" video.
- Began filming of Community Drinking Water PSA featuring local community members which is scheduled to launch in early 2021.

- Completed "<u>Working with the Carson River</u>" presentation on River Geomorphology for decision makers and county staff.
- Continued to update and manage the CWSD website, making it more user friendly, clear, and comprehensive.
- Sent CRC e-blasts via Mail Chimp to nearly 900 individuals.
- Developed biannual digital newsletter sent to nearly 900 individuals watershed wide. Hardcopies provided to libraries throughout the watershed.
- Conducted FEMA outreach events for flood awareness program.

Activities conducted to support Alpine Watershed Group Environmental Education Program in 2020 included:

- CWSD provided \$25,000 in funding assistance to AWG to support their programs.
- Created E-Waiver forms to eliminate paper at river events.
- Provided drone mapping for monitoring to assist with West Fork Restoration Project.

Activities conducted to support River Wranglers Environmental Education Program in 2020 included:

- CWSD provided \$26,000 in funding to River Wranglers (RW) to conduct Conserve Carson River Workdays. The RW EE Coordinator maintained partnerships with local schools and offered opportunities for students to increase their knowledge and understanding of water quality, environmental, and flooding issues in the watershed.
- Provided filming assistance with online outreach events.

Recreation:

Applied for a NV State Parks Recreation Trail Grant to expand the Carson River Aquatic Trail. Awards will be announced Spring of 2021.



Looking Ahead to 2021

CWSD will continue to work with federal, state, tribal, and local entities to leverage time and money through cooperative projects and programs. CWSD will continue to pursue federal and state grants to assist counties and local districts. As a regional district, our integrated watershed approach will continue to assist entities to maximize project benefits, mitigate challenges, and avoid duplication of efforts for the benefit of the Carson River Watershed. CWSD will continue to coordinate the Carson River Coalition (CRC), a large stakeholder group comprised of staff members of federal, tribal, state, local government organizations, and the general public, that acts as a steering committee for the Integrated Watershed Planning Process. This stakeholder model continues to be successful as it provides the unique opportunity to work across multiple jurisdictions and share perspectives, as issues within the watershed often do not end at jurisdictional boundaries.

CWSD will continue to work with the CRC to update and implement regional plans to ensure ongoing federal and state funding is funneled to regional programs and projects. We look forward to continuing these efforts to

complete the tasks ahead and promote cooperative action for the health of the Carson River Watershed.

In 2021 the following work is anticipated:

Watershed Coordination

- Continue "I Am Carson River Watershed" Campaign with finalization of a Community Drinking Water PSA and new vignettes entitled "Watershed Moments." The "Watershed Moments" PSAs will focus on nonpoint source pollution and feature members of the watershed community.
- Coordinate the Carson River Coalition and working groups.
- Host a virtual Carson River Watershed Management Forum.
- Coordinate a "Get on the Bus" Tour of CR Watershed (post COVID).
- Apply to NDEP for CWA Section 319(h) /106 and possibly 208 funding for Watershed Coordination Program, drone monitoring, etc.
- Coordinate funding with Counties and Weed Conservation Districts.
- Host CRC Weed Summit.
- Create and implement a CWSD funding strategy and continue to implement the stewardship plan implementation strategy.
- Complete river rehabilitation structure inventory and mapping database.
- Host an AmeriCorps Watershed Technician position.
- Assist Douglas County with Westwood
 Neighborhood and Douglas HS LID project.
- Implementation of grant deliverables dependent on award for Expansion of Carson River Aquatic Trail grant.

Floodplain Management

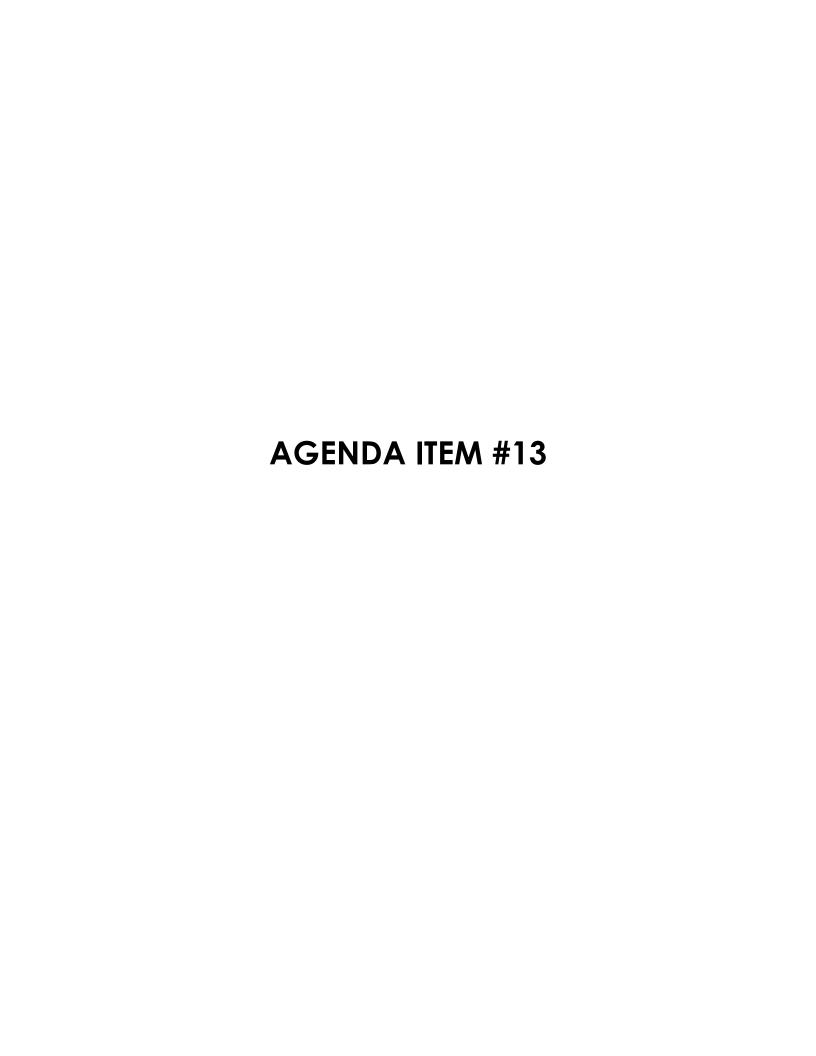
- CWSD staff will facilitate CRC Floodplain Management working group.
- Work with counties to improve floodplain management plan to maximize points for community rating system.
- Continue with FEMA Mapping Activity Statement (MAS) 10.
- FEMA MAS 11 projects.
- Apply for FEMA MAS 12 funding.
- Continue to work with CRC to implement suggested actions outlined in the Regional Floodplain Management Plan as adopted by each County.

Water Supply

- Continue to develop water marketing strategy for the Carson River Watershed with funding for USBR.
- CWSD will continue to work with Alpine County to provide Mesa Vista Groundwater Monitoring and maintain CASGEM (California Statewide Groundwater Elevation Monitoring).
- 2021 Water and Wastewater Rate Report.

SUBJECT: Agenda Item #13– For Possible Action: Discussion regarding introducing legislation to have Storey County and Alpine County become official members on CWSD

DISCUSSION: Steve Walker, with Walker and Associates, has been working with Storey County and CWSD to approach State Senator James Settelmeyer to introduce a BDR to have Storey County become an official member of CWSD. Mr. Walker will also discuss the possibility of including Alpine County in the BDR. Attached is the legislation that established CWSD.

Below are some of the proposed changes to CWSD's legislation from Steve Walker:

SEC 10. Sub 1 - I believe the expansion of Storey and Alpine would have to be captured here as well with the same type of language "is hereby expanded to include that portion of Storey County, Nevada and Alpine County, California within the Carson River Watershed."

SEC 10. Sub 4 - would need language added to describe the General Fund exception for Storey and Alpine Counties as being equal to the 3 cents of the \$100 of assessed valuation on all private properties within the expanded boundaries of the new District within the respective Counties..

I think we are alright on SEC 10. Sub 8 (the 7 cents for special districts within the district) because when Churchill was added they did not modify this Sub section. (This language was part of the original legislation. The original idea was the 3 cents per 100 assessed valuation was to be used to run the operation and conduct studies. The 7 cents per 100 assessed valuation was to fund capital projects. Over the years CWSD has been able to use the 3 cents to pay for capital projects. To date CWSD has no plans to use the 7 cents option, but it does not hurt to leave the language in the legislation.)

Some additional proposed changes to CWSD's legislation from Staff:

If the legislation includes only Storey County, then the following:

- Sec 10. Sub 3 -changing members from 11 to 13 with the addition of Storey County.
- Sec 10. Sub 3 add (e) defining two members from Storey County
- Sec 10. Sec 3 modify the last sentence to change affirmative vote from six to seven.

If the legislation includes Storey County and Alpine County, then the following:

- Sec 10. Sub 3 -changing members from 11 to 15
- Sec 10. Sub 3 add (e) and (f). defining two members from Storey and Alpine County
- Sec 10. Sec 3 last sentence to change affirmative vote from six to eight.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Provide direction to staff.

WATER AND SEWER DISTRICTS, SYSTEMS AND PROJECTS

CARSON WATER SUBCONSERVANCY DISTRICT ACT

CHAPTER 621, STATUTES OF NEVADA 1989

AN ACT relating to water conservancy districts; revising provisions concerning appropriation of water by local governments and water companies; revising provisions concerning the formation of conservancy and subconservancy districts; including Carson City within the Carson Water Subconservancy District; reorganizing and expanding the powers of the Carson Water Subconservancy District from acquiring water rights by eminent domain; authorizing cities and counties within the Carson Water Subconservancy District to form special districts and to impose a tax for the support of the special district; and all other matters properly relating thereto.

[Approved: June 30, 1989]

(Leadlines for sections have been supplied by the Legislative Counsel of the State of Nevada)

The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Sec. 9. Legislative findings and declaration. The Legislature hereby finds and declares that:

- 1. Reductions in the supply of available water, fragmented responsibility for the conservation and supply of water, and certain limitations on the authority of existing water conservancy districts are threatening the health, safety and welfare of the people living in the Carson River Basin;
- 2. This threat can be alleviated through the inclusion of the urban portion of Carson City in the Carson Water Subconservancy District and expanding the authority of the subconservancy district and the local governments in which it is situated;
- 3. The intent of the Legislature in adopting this act is that the powers conferred by this act will be exercised in a manner that will foster cooperation among the local governments participating in the Carson Water Subconservancy District; and
- 4. The unique division of water and financial resources among the local governments participating in the Carson Water Subconservancy District prevents making a general law applicable.

(Ch. 621, Stats. 1989 p. 1408)

Sec. 10. Creation and expansion; composition and powers of board of directors; establishment and powers of special districts.

- 1. The Carson Water Subconservancy District, as expanded to include the urban area of Carson City, is hereby expanded to include that portion of Churchill County within the Carson River hydrologic basin. The assets and liabilities of the existing district become the assets and liabilities of the newly formed district on July 1, 1999.
- 2. The Carson Water Subconservancy District shall be deemed to have been created pursuant to <u>chapter 541</u> of NRS, with the same powers and duties, and subject to the same limitations as a water conservancy district created pursuant to that chapter except that the provisions of this act supersede the provisions of <u>chapter 541</u> of NRS where the provisions of that chapter conflict with the express provisions of this act.
- 3. The Board of Directors of the Carson Water Subconservancy District consists of 11 members to be appointed as follows:
 - (a) Two members who are residents of Carson City appointed by the Board of Supervisors of Carson City;
- (b) Two members who are residents of Lyon County appointed by the Board of County Commissioners of Lyon County;
- (c) Five members who are residents of Douglas County, at least two of whom must represent agricultural interests in the county, appointed by the Board of County Commissioners of Douglas County; and
- (d) Two members who are residents of Churchill County appointed by the Board of County Commissioners of Churchill County.
- → No action may be taken by the board without the affirmative vote of at least six members.
- 4. The Board of Directors may levy a tax upon all taxable property within the Carson Water Subconservancy District at a rate of not more than 3 cents on each \$100 of assessed valuation for carrying out the activities of the

district. The tax must be collected in the manner provided in <u>chapter 541</u> of NRS. The limitations in <u>chapter 354</u> of NRS upon revenue from taxes ad valorem do not apply to revenue received from a tax levied pursuant to this subsection.

- 5. The Board of Directors may issue general or special obligations to carry out the activities of the district, including, without limitation, the acquisition of water rights and the acquisition, construction or completion of waterworks, facilities, flood control or drainage projects or other projects in accordance with NRS 350.500 to 350.720, inclusive. Any general obligations issued pursuant to this subsection must comply with the provisions of NRS 350.020. The provisions of NRS 541.340 to 541.370, inclusive, do not apply to obligations issued pursuant to this subsection.
 - 6. The Board of Directors may pledge:
 - (a) Any money received from the proceeds of the tax imposed pursuant to subsection 4;
- (b) The gross or net revenues derived from water rights, waterworks, facilities, flood control or drainage projects or other projects; and
- (c) The special assessments collected by the district for maintaining and operating waterworks, facilities, flood control or drainage projects and other projects,
- → for the payment of general or special obligations issued pursuant to subsection 5. For the purposes of subsection 3 of NRS 350.020 and NRS 350.500 to 350.720, inclusive, money pledged by the board pursuant to this subsection shall be deemed to be pledged revenue of the project.
- 7. The Carson Water Subconservancy District shall not acquire water rights, or other property for the purpose of obtaining the appurtenant water rights, through the exercise of the power of eminent domain.
- 8. Carson City and each county located in part or in whole within the Carson Water Subconservancy District may establish a special district consisting of all or any portion of the land within the boundaries of the local government. The governing body of the local government is ex officio the board of directors of the district. Each special district may levy a tax upon all taxable property within its boundaries at a rate of not more than 7 cents on each \$100 of assessed valuation. The tax must be collected in the same manner as other taxes ad valorem collected by the local government. The revenue from the tax must be used to allow the district to plan, construct, maintain and operate waterworks, facilities, flood control or drainage projects or other projects, and to obtain water and water rights for the benefit of the district. The limitations in chapter 354 of NRS upon revenue from taxes ad valorem do not apply to revenue received from a tax levied pursuant to this subsection. A district for which a tax is levied pursuant to this subsection is not entitled to receive any distribution of supplemental city-county relief tax. Districts established pursuant to this subsection may enter into cooperative agreements pursuant to chapter 277 of NRS concerning the management of the waterworks or resources.
- 9. The Carson Water Subconservancy District may, for the payment of general or special obligations issued pursuant to subsection 5, pledge any money received from the proceeds of a tax imposed by a special district established pursuant to subsection 8 if:
- (a) The Carson Water Subconservancy District and the special district established pursuant to subsection 8 have entered into a cooperative agreement pursuant to chapter 277 of NRS; and
- (b) The cooperative agreement authorizes the Carson Water Subconservancy District to pledge the money received from the proceeds of that tax.
 - (Ch. 621, Stats. 1989 p. 1408; A Ch. 319, Stats. 1997 p. 1200; Ch. 189, Stats. 1999 p. 922)

Sec. 10.5. Powers of certain local governments located partially or wholly within District.

- 1. The Board of Supervisors of Carson City and the board of county commissioners of each county located in part or in whole within the Carson Water Subconservancy District may levy a tax upon all taxable property within its boundaries at a rate of not more than 7 cents on each \$100 of assessed valuation for the acquisition, construction or completion of waterworks, facilities, flood control or drainage projects or other projects. The tax must be collected in the same manner as other taxes ad valorem collected by the local government. Any general obligations issued pursuant to this subsection must comply with the provisions of NRS 350.020. The provisions of NRS 541.340 to 541.370, inclusive, do not apply to obligations issued pursuant to this subsection.
- 3. The Board of Supervisors of Carson City and the board of county commissioners of each county located in whole or in part within the Carson Water Subconservancy District may pledge:
 - (a) Any money received from the proceeds of the tax imposed pursuant to subsection 1;

- (b) The gross or net revenues derived from waterworks, facilities, flood control or drainage projects or other projects; and
- (c) The special assessments collected by the local government for maintaining and operating waterworks, facilities, flood control or drainage projects or other projects,
- \rightarrow for the payment of general or special obligations issued pursuant to subsection 2. For the purposes of subsection 3 of <u>NRS 350.020</u> and <u>NRS 350.500</u> to <u>350.720</u>, inclusive, money pledged by the governing body of a local government pursuant to this subsection shall be deemed to be pledged revenue of the project.

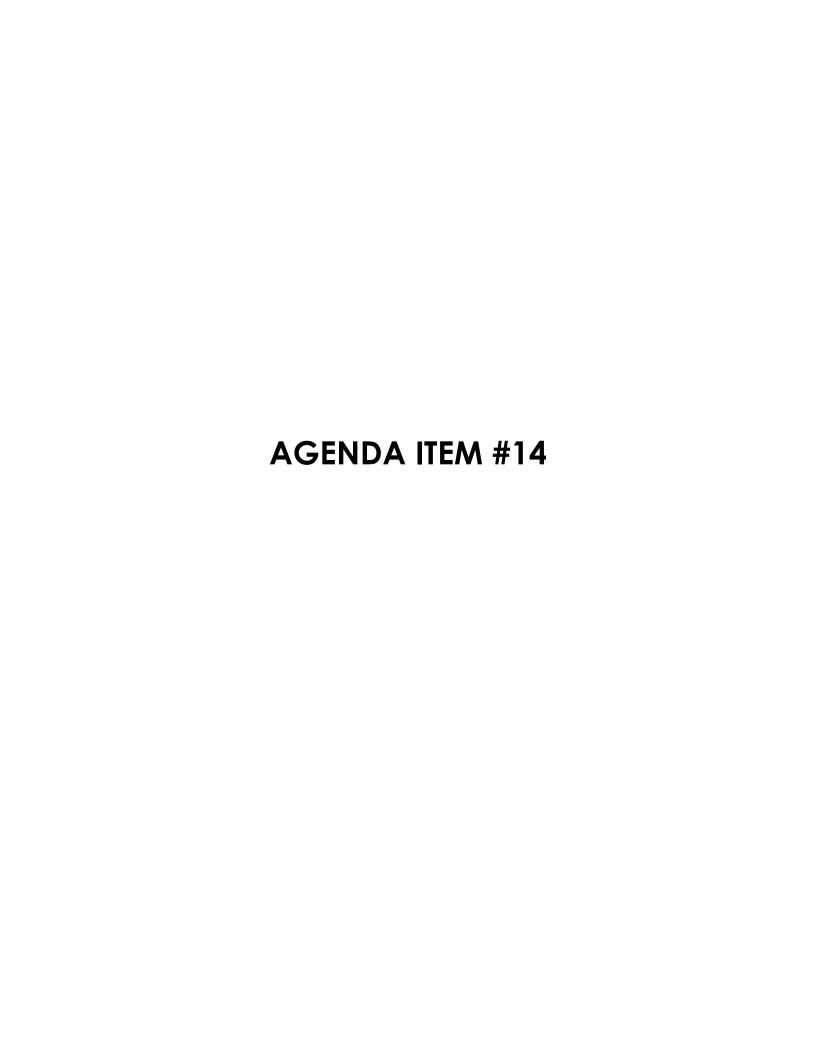

Sec. 11. Ratification of certain actions taken before June 30, 1989; composition of boards of directors for certain districts and subdistricts; appointment and terms of members of and vacancies on board for Carson Water Subconservancy District.

- 1. The establishment of any water conservancy district or subdistrict pursuant to <u>chapter 541</u> of NRS before the effective date of this act, all actions taken by such districts and subdistricts, and the appointment of director for such districts and subdistricts, are hereby ratified. All such districts and subdistricts shall amend the petitions by which they were established within 6 months after the effective date of this act to specify the composition of their boards of directors. If a district or subdistrict includes land within more than one county, each county must have at least one representative on the board, and the representative or representatives of each county must be appointed from a list of two or more nominees submitted by the board of county commissioners of the represented county.
- 2. As soon as practicable after the effective date of this act, the authorities specified in subsection 3 of section 10 of this act shall appoint the initial members of the Board of Directors of the Carson Water Subconservancy District. Three of the members initially appointed by Douglas County and one of the members initially appointed by Lyon County and Carson City shall serve until the end of the second calendar year next succeeding their appointment. The remaining members of the board initially appointed shall serve until the end of the fourth calendar year next succeeding their appointment.
- 3. After the initial terms, members of the Board of Directors of the Carson Water Subconservancy District hold office for terms of 4 years or until their successors have been appointed. Any vacancy on the Board must be filled for the remainder of the unexpired term by the authority that appointed the member whose position is vacant.

2021 Nevada Legislation Session

DISCUSSION: CWSD staff is beginning to monitor the various Bill Draft Requests (BDRs) for the 2021 Nevada Legislative Session. Below is the list of BDRs that staff is watching. Currently this is just an information item. Staff anticipates meeting with the Legislative Committee after the January Board meeting to go into detail on each bill and to make recommendations on possible action, if any, CWSD may want to take.

Below is a summary of the various BDRs that have draft bill language:

AB5

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law provides that any person feeling aggrieved by an order or decision of the State Engineer that affects the person's interests may have the order or decision reviewed by a court. The review is conducted as an informal summary review in the nature of an appeal. (NRS 533.450) This bill limits the circumstances in which such an aggrieved person may have a determination of the State Engineer reviewed by a court to require that the determination: (1) be a formal order, ruling or decision that is a final determination issued in writing; and (2) materially affect the person's interests. This bill also clarifies that the practice in civil appellate cases applies to the judicial review of an order, ruling or decision of the State Engineer.

AB 6

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

With certain exceptions, existing law requires a person who wishes to change the place of diversion, manner of use or place of use of water already appropriated to apply to the State Engineer for a permit to do so. (NRS 533.325) Existing law requires the State Engineer to hold a hearing on an application for a temporary change to the place of diversion, manner of use or place of use of water already appropriated if the State Engineer determines that such a change may not be in the public interest or may impair the water rights of others. (NRS 533.345) This bill makes the holding of a hearing on such an application discretionary.

AB 34

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

During the 2015 Legislative Session, Assembly Bill No. 77 replaced references to the cutting, eradication, removal, or destruction of weeds with the term "control." (Chapter 526, Statutes of Nevada 2015, at page 3588) **Section 1** of this bill defines "control" to mean the cutting, destruction or eradication of established noxious weed populations to prevent: (1) the spread, maturation and

dispersal of any propagative part of the noxious weed; and (2) the reproduction and spread of such noxious weeds.

Existing law authorizes the Director of the State Department of Agriculture to, by regulation, establish and administer a program to certify agricultural products as being free from noxious weeds to: (1) support the control and prevention of the spread of noxious weeds in this State; and (2) allow businesses in this State to market such agricultural products as being in compliance with any applicable federal law or regulation or any other requirement specified by the Director. (NRS 555.010) **Sections 1** and **2** of this bill expand the program by authorizing the Director to: (1) adopt such regulations to certify agricultural products as being free from any propagative parts from which a noxious weed may grow; and (2) establish and collect reasonable fees for the program. **Section 2** additionally expands the purposes of the program to include allowing businesses in this State to market agricultural products as being in compliance with the guidelines set forth by the North American Invasive Species Management Association, in addition to applicable federal law or regulation or any other requirement specified by the Director.

Existing law authorizes the Department to provide a written notice of its finding that an area is infested with certain pests, noxious weeds or plant diseases to the owner or occupant of the area. (NRS 555.100) Existing law also authorizes the State Quarantine Officer to serve notice on the owner or occupant of land where noxious weeds are found. (NRS 555.160) **Sections 3** and **4** of this bill authorizes such notices to be served by electronic mail.

SB 10

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law provides for a partial abatement of property taxes, which has the effect of establishing an annual cap on increases of property taxes. The formula for calculating the partial abatement provides that the property taxes on properties other than certain single-family residences or certain residential rental dwellings may not increase by more than a percentage that is the lesser of: (1) the average percentage of change in the assessed valuation of property in the county over the last 10 years, twice the average percentage of increase in the Consumer Price Index for the previous year or zero, whichever is greater; or (2) 8 percent. If the application of this formula results in a cap on increases of property taxes for a fiscal year that is less than 3 percent, the property taxes imposed on certain single-family residences and certain residential rental dwellings may not increase by more than the percentage cap calculated under that formula. However, if the application of the formula results in a cap on increases of property taxes for a fiscal year that is 3 percent or more, the property taxes on those single-family residences and residential rental properties may not increase by more than 3 percent. (NRS 361.4722-361.4724)

This bill revises the formula for calculating the partial abatement so that the annual cap on increases of the property taxes on certain single-family residences and residential rental property is 3 percent. Under this bill, the annual cap on increases of property taxes on any other property cannot be less than 3 percent or more than 8 percent.

SB 64

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Under current law, the taxable value of an improvement made on real property must be determined by subtracting from the cost of replacement of the improvement all applicable depreciation and

obsolescence. That depreciation is required to be calculated at the rate of 1.5 percent of the cost of replacement of the improvement for each year that the improvement has aged, up to a maximum of 50 years. (NRS 361.227) The application of this formula for the entire 50-year period results in a maximum rate of depreciation of 75 percent of the cost of replacement. **Section 1** of this bill reduces the future rate of depreciation for an improvement made on real property to 1 percent of the cost of replacement of the improvement for each year that the improvement ages after calendar year 2021. **Section 1** does not affect the maximum rate of depreciation allowed under current law. **Section 6** of this bill clarifies that the change in the rate of depreciation pursuant to **section 1** does not affect the determination of the taxable value of any improvements for the purposes of any property taxes imposed before July 1, 2022.

Existing law provides for a partial abatement of property taxes, which has the effect of establishing an annual cap on increases of property taxes. The formula for calculating the partial abatement provides that the property taxes on properties other than certain single-family residences or certain residential rental dwellings may not increase by more than a percentage that is the lesser of: (1) the average percentage of change in the assessed valuation of property in the county over the last 10 years, twice the average percentage of increase in the Consumer Price Index for the previous year or zero, whichever is greater; or (2) 8 percent. If the application of this formula results in a cap on increases of property taxes for a fiscal year that is less than 3 percent, the property taxes imposed on certain single-family residences and certain residential rental dwellings may not increase by more than the percentage cap calculated under that formula. However, if the application of the formula results in a cap on increases of property taxes for a fiscal year that is 3 percent or more, the property taxes on those single-family residences and residential rental properties may not increase by more than 3 percent. (NRS 361.4722-361.4724)

Section 2 of this bill revises the formula for calculating the partial abatement of property taxes so that the annual cap on increases of the property taxes on property other than certain single-family residences and residential rental property is 8 percent. **Sections 3** and **4** of this bill makes conforming changes to reflect that because of the amendatory provisions of **section 2**, the annual cap on increases of the property taxes on certain single-family residences and residential rental properties will be 3 percent.

SJR 1

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Under the Nevada Constitution, the district courts of this State have original jurisdiction over all cases excluded by law from the original jurisdiction of the justice courts, and the Nevada Supreme Court and Nevada Court of Appeals have appellate jurisdiction over civil cases arising in district courts and in criminal cases within the original jurisdiction of the district courts. (Nev. Const. Art. 6, §§ 4, 6) This resolution proposes to amend the Nevada Constitution to provide that the Nevada Court of Appeals has original jurisdiction in any civil case brought by a person challenging a final order or decision of the State Engineer.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Receive and file.

Dear Selection Committee for the Andy Aldax Award,

There are many unsung heroes in the Carson River watershed, people making a difference and educating others about the health of our river without fanfare or expectations of recognition. Phyllis Lipka Atkinson is our watershed hero.

Phyllis began teaching 7th grade science in Silver Springs, Nevada, near the Big Bend of the Carson River, in 1995. River Wranglers (RW) worked with her and because of her enthusiasm and interest, students began science exploration on the banks of the Carson River at Ft. Churchill State Historic Park. When she left Lyon County, she took a teaching position at Carson Middle School where she maintained her relationship with River Wranglers and enjoyed many years teaching 6th through 8th grade science classes. She was awarded a water quality monitoring trunk from the Nevada Division of Water Quality Planning and she arranged field trips to Ambrose Park with 8th grade students. I remember her gathering her students around her along the trail leading down to the river and helping them visually understand the concept of a watershed as she pointed out the surrounding mountains, all draining snowmelt to the Carson River. It was an "aha moment" when you realized that they understood how the watershed was related to the river. The water monitoring trunk outfitted her students with chemical test kits, goggles and gloves to perform tests to check pH, temperature, dissolved oxygen, and turbidity. They also had boots, kick nets, and scopes to assess the biological diversity in the river. These are our future scientists, artists, beauticians, teachers, factory workers, writers, parents, mechanics, politicians and voters learning the science and value of healthy rivers.

While Phyllis was being paid to teach, her creativity and ingenuity made it possible to develop lesson plans using the Carson River as her platform. She was very inclusive and when not able to link the subject matter directly to Carson River education, she encouraged other teachers to work with us. One year, with help from Phyllis, RW presented the Carson River History trunk to all 7th grade students studying Nevada history at Carson Middle School. She believes in the value of watershed-based education and encourages others to also value place-based education.

Phyllis Atkinson served on the board of directors for River Wranglers as well as the Silver Saddle Ranch. She was one of the key organizers of the High Sierra Camp which provided backcountry experiences for Nevada youth. She was selected as the Science Department Chairperson for the 6th and 8th grades at Carson Middle School. In 2001 she was recognized for her leadership by the Carson River Advisory Committee. Phyllis was selected as the Rotary Club Teacher of the Month, received the Golden Apple Award from the Carson City School District and was Teacher of the Year at Carson Middle School and Pioneer High School.

Phyllis Atkinson, after her 25th year of education, retired from Pioneer High School last spring. She worked diligently to give students real life science opportunities along the Carson River. Her Leadership class was involved in a year-long Carson River Watershed mentoring program with Seeliger Elementary 4th graders.

It is easy, just and fitting that RW sing the praises of an advocate like Phyllis Atkinson. She makes a difference daily to the students in her classroom and those students carry forth the message that the Carson River is our Lifeline in the Desert.

Dear Ed,

Please accept this letter as a nomination of the Alpine Watershed Group (AWG) for this year's Andy Aldax Award. This is the 20th anniversary year of the AWG as a formal organization, although they were also active in protecting the upper Carson River watershed before that as an informal group of dedicated volunteers. Currently the AWG has three full-time staff and hosts of volunteers from Alpine County and other nearby counties in both Nevada and California.

Over the years the AWG has been extremely effective in multiplying the support it has received from the Carson Water Subconservancy District (CWSD). Since 2009 the AWG has leveraged the \$227,500 it has been awarded by the CWSD to attract \$1.5 million in additional funding from governments, foundations, and non-profits. All of these funds have been invested in improving and protecting water quality in the upper Carson River watershed.

Notable past and present projects to improve water quality in the upper Carson River watershed include:

- Water quality monitoring. Four times/year at eight sites since 2004.
- Harmful Algal Bloom monitoring. 2019 and 2020 at reservoirs in cooperation with State Water Board.
- South Tahoe Public Utility District effluent monitoring for Contaminants of Emerging Concern during 2018 through 2020.
- Hope Valley Meadow Restoration. Partner with American Rivers for initial log-crib and restoration projects in 2015 and 2016. Managed stabilizing 450 ft. of eroding bank during 2020.
- Grover Hot Springs Meadow Restoration. Ongoing removal of invasive weeds including hosting Earth Day community workday since 2016. Water monitoring and interpretive signs for new ADA compliant trail in cooperation with California State Parks.
- East Carson Off-Highway Vehicle Restoration Project in 2017. Restored 5.15 acres of riparian habitat at seven sites along the East Fork Carson River above Hangman's Bridge. The entire 6.5mile reach of river is now protected from riparian damage due to vehicles.
- Rivers and Ranches Project in 2016. Provided support to help a rancher improve the ranch's management practices, pasture utilization, and infrastructure to protect the health of the adjacent West Fork Carson River.

- Environmental Education Program for youth and adults. Includes working with the School District and water quality monitoring training for volunteers.
- Markleeville Creek Day. Annual cleanup of Markleeville Creek including protection of heritage trees from beavers and projects at other Carson River watershed sites including invasive weeds removal and willow planting.

I do note that although the Andy Aldax award is generally given to individuals, there have been exceptions in the past where the award was presented to a family and an informal group of individuals.

On behalf of the Nevada Division of Environmental Protection's Bureau of Water Quality Planning, it is my pleasure to nominate Mr. Duane Petite to receive the prestigious Andy Aldax Award from the Carson Water Subconservancy District in 2021. Mr. Petite has been a friend and advocate of the Carson River for many years, providing significant contributions in promoting and achieving the Carson River Watershed Vision outlined in the Carson Water Subconservancy District's Carson River Adaptive Stewardship Plan.

As a member of the Alpine Watershed Group, an active member of the Carson River Coalition, and longtime manager of the Nature Conservancy's River Fork Ranch, Mr. Petite advocated for the development of a healthy and sustainable Carson River watershed, and put actions behind his words while managing River Fork Ranch and the Whit Hall Interpretive Center. For over 10 years, Mr. Petite served as the Carson River Project Director during his tenure with the Nature Conservancy under three different State Directors. In this role, Mr. Petite managed all operations of the ranch, including management of the grazing lease, implementation of watershed improvement projects in partnership with the Carson Valley Conservation District and others, and management of all aspects of the Interpretive Center. The hub of the ranch, Whit Hall, was open to be utilized by many organizations for meetings and conservation workshops, by teachers providing conservation education to hundreds of students, and for celebrations of conservation accomplishments in the watershed.

One of the more important watershed improvement projects on the ranch that Duane oversaw was the removal of berms adjacent to the Carson River that impeded floodwaters from reaching further extents of floodplain. The berms were removed and floodplain terraces recontoured; allowing floodwaters to be received, stored, filtered, and slowly released downstream. By allowing flood waters to occupy more floodplain, potential negative impacts to downstream infrastructure was mitigated. A secondary, yet vital project on the ranch was the construction of recreational trails which are available for use by the public, even now during the Covid-19 pandemic. Allowing public access to this demonstration working ranch that is sustainably managed under conservation easement is an incredibly effective environmental outreach measure.

Mr. Petite's extensive watershed knowledge, active listening communication style, and effective management actions have helped to achieve a more healthy and sustainable Carson River watershed, specifically in the upper and middle reaches.


